So the dance teacher has her teacher hat but also wears the hats (roles) of being a parent, child, friend, neighbour and colleague. Each of these roles requires her to wear different hats at different times depending on what she is doing.

In December because the weather turns colder we often see people's hats (and scarves and gloves). They may be plain, sombre colours or perhaps they are bright and jazzy. You may have a Christmas pudding hat or a practical tweed cap. Do you have a favourite?

In the coming month we will hear the Christmas story retold in St Mary's whether by our toddlers or pre-school, one of the local nurseries or schools or on Christmas morning. In September and October I led assemblies on the theme of respect at Highfield Infants' and Junior Schools, and Harris Primary Academy Shortlands. The children had been learning what respect means and how we respect other people.

I told the children the story of The Good Samaritan, or Good Stranger (Luke 10, 30-37). Jesus told this story to illustrate what it means to keep one of God's commandments in the Bible: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your strength and all your mind ... Love your neighbour as you love yourself.'

This story tells us that all people - including those who are different from us - are equally valuable and that we should treat others with care and respect.

If a Samaritan could be a neighbour to a Jew, and Jesus told us to 'go and do the same', then all of God's people must be our neighbours and we must love them just as the Samaritan man did.

Saint of the Month December St Nicholas – 6 December

St Nicholas, or Santa Claus, is one of the most popular saints of Christendom with countless churches dedicated to him. Yet all that is known for sure about him is that he was the bishop of Myra in Southern Turkey in the fourth century.

However there are many legends about him. For example, he had a reputation for secret gift-giving, such as putting coins in the shoes of those who left them out for him, a practice celebrated on his feast day.

Another legend tells how, during a terrible famine, a malicious butcher lured three little children into his house, where he killed them, placing their remains in a barrel to cure, planning to sell them off as ham. St Nicholas, visiting the region to care for the hungry, resurrected the three children by his prayers.

In his most famous exploit, a poor man had three daughters but could not afford a proper dowry for them. This meant that they would remain unmarried and probably would have to become prostitutes. Hearing of the girls' plight, Nicholas decided to help them, so he went to the house at night and threw three purses filled with gold coins through their open window.

Many years after he died about half of his bones were reburied in Bari, while the other half were later taken to Venice!

He is the patron saint of bakers, brewers, brides, children, merchants, pawnbrokers and travellers.

Following the Camino

Twenty-eight members of St Mary's congregation and friends travelled to Santiago de Compostela in October, in a trip led by Rev Bruce Driver, of Bromley College. The trip followed part of the 'Camino' or 'Way': the route taken by pilgrims since the Middle Ages to the site of the remains of St James in north-western Spain.

The travellers did not attempt to walk or cycle the 480 miles of the French route, but travelled by coach, joining the Way at Burgos, around 300 miles from Santiago.

Having explored the beautiful cathedral and historic centre of that city, they moved on to Leon, a further 110 miles along the route. For many, the medieval stained glass windows of Leon cathedral were a

highlight of the trip, as was a service of communion held for the group in the cathedral.

The journey continued on to Santiago itself, where the group enjoyed a guided tour of the cathedral and historic city centre. Having participated in the group's own service of communion in the cathedral earlier in the day, many returned that evening to attend the Pilgrims' Mass, which included the use of the largest censer (container of incense) in the world. Ropes were pulled bringing the censer into a swinging motion almost to the roof of the cathedral, reaching speeds of 80km per hour.

Some of the travellers also managed to find time to walk the last 5km of the Way, starting at the site where pilgrims first get a glimpse of the city of Santiago.

Valerie Burton, one of those travelling, said 'People have different reasons for going to Santiago de Compostela: it gave me time to reflect'. Annette German remembered many special moments of reflection as the coach passed those making the pilgrimage on foot. She said: 'Feeling the presence of St Mary's congregation in an utterly different environment, it was good to be in a different place, it's what pilgrimage is all about'.


