# Changed by an encounter

January the sixth, Epiphany, is the day when churches celebrate the kings, sometimes referred to as wise men or magi, visiting the infant Jesus in Bethlehem. It also marks the end of Christmas: the time to take down the cards, lights and decorations and return the crib, holy family, shepherds, sheep, angels and those kings to the box; putting them away for another year. As you put away the kings, or any Christmas cards that feature them, do you ever wonder what happened to them or how the visit might have changed them?

The brief account of their visit in Matthew's gospel says that 'having been warned in a dream not to return to King Herod they returned by another road'. Clearly they avoided Jerusalem on their return journey, but it is telling us something deeper as well.

The kings were star-gazers. Whether you interpret the future by looking at the stars in the wide clear skies of the Middle East, or reading your horoscope in the newspaper, you have a view of a world where the future has already been determined and there is nothing that you can do about it.

The kings clearly believed this and had invested a lot of time making a difficult journey to Bethlehem on this basis. But something in their encounter with the infant Jesus changed this view. They now understood that they had choices; choices that could change future events. If they returned via Jerusalem, Herod would kill Jesus. If they returned by a different road Jesus would survive. The rest of the gospels are full of stories of people being changed by encounters with Jesus; realising that they have choices and that these choices will make a difference.

As you pack away the kings, you may wish to remember how they were changed by their meeting with Jesus. As you pack away Jesus, or pictures of him on Christmas cards, you may ask yourself if you encountered him in any new way at Christmas and whether you should find out more about how he changes other lives. As you look towards the New Year, and prepare to face the opportunities and challenges that it will bring, what choices will you face and how might they change things for other people?



#### A conversation between God and people

Choral Evensong is a particularly English style of evening prayer which is celebrated by Anglicans around the world. In England it dates from Thomas Cranmer's first Book of Common Prayer in 1549, when he joined the Latin offices of Vespers (evening prayer) and Compline (night prayer) to produce English Evensong as the regular prayer at the end of the day.

Choral Evensong consists of Prayers, Collects, Canticles (the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis), Psalms, Responses and an Anthem. It is drawn almost entirely from the Bible. Its primary purpose is to proclaim the wonderful works of God in history and in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Its secondary purpose is to evoke from the worshipper a response of praise, penitence, prayer and obedience.

A service sheet from Coventry cathedral has described it as '...a very tiny fragment of something else. When you come to Evensong it is as if you were dropping in on a conversation already in progress. A conversation between God and people which began long before you were born and will go on long after you are dead'.

At St Mary's we generally have Choral Evensong on the 3rd Sunday of each month. Do come and support this wonderful tradition of church music on Sunday 17th January at 6.30pm to hear our wonderful choir. We will be singing the Canticles by Dyson in F, Responses by Reading and the Anthem will be 'There shall be a Star' by Mendelssohn.

## **Mission of the month**

#### **The Leprosy Mission**


Leprosy is widely believed to be the world's oldest disease, and it is certainly one of the most stigmatised.

The disease destroys nerve tissue and, because of the loss of sensation, a person may put their hand into boiling water or step on a sharp object and feel nothing. The injury causes no pain and the patient, often living in poverty, ignores their treatment. Left unchecked, the infection consumes bone mass: the result is that the finger or toe, foot or hand look as if they have been gnawed off. Sufferers are excluded from society and are often unable to access healthcare.

Since 1982, leprosy has been curable with multidrug therapy and research to produce a vaccine to prevent the spread of leprosy continues. Early diagnosis and treatment are essential to prevent sufferers from consequential and permanent injury and disability.

The Leprosy Mission (TLM) is a Christian organisation working in over thirty countries worldwide, principally in Africa and Asia, transforming the lives of those affected. TLM has a vision for a world without leprosy. Sadly there are currently more than three million people living with irreversible disabilities, and World Health Organisation records show that someone is diagnosed with leprosy every two minutes.



## A diamond day

On 22nd November St Mary's celebrated the 60th anniversary of the day when the church, rebuilt after the war, was dedicated or 'consecrated'.

Bob Stewart MP popped in to see the displays, which told the story of how the original church, which dated from 1868, was reduced to rubble by a V1 flying bomb in July 1944. The church's spire fell in one piece, flat on the ground: local children joked that they could walk up the spire without needing a steeplejack's harness!

The displays included a piece of shrapnel, believed to be from one of the bombs and recovered from near the west window. There was also a piece of carved window masonry from the old church, which has had a home in a garden rockery in St Mary's Avenue for many years.

While the church congregation raised the funds to build the new church they worshipped in a parish room in Shortlands village, and, on the anniversary of the bombing, in a tent on the site. Once they started building the new church, services were held in and around the building site! The church was consecrated on 20 November 1955.

As part of the commemorative events, a workshop was held for children during which they learned about life during World War Two.

A short reflection was held close to the War Memorial during which those from Shortlands who died in the service of their country were remembered, and we thought about some of the events of the War which affected our community during that time.

A Songs of Praise service included hymns that were sung during the service of consecration 60 years ago, and Rev Richard Finch reminded us that the church is its people. We took stones from a cairn away with us to remind us that we take the love of God out into our daily lives.
