Who is my neighbour?

The bishops of the Church of England have written a letter urging Christians to consider the question how can we 'build the kind of society which many people say they want but which is not yet being expressed in the vision of any of the parties?'

The letter encourages church members to engage in the political process ahead of the General Election and to put aside self-interest and vote for the common good: 'The privileges of living in a democracy mean that we should use our votes thoughtfully, prayerfully and with the good of others in mind, not just our own interests.'

The letter specifically avoids advocacy for any one political party but instead encourages those in the Church to seek from political candidates a commitment to building a society of common bonds over individual consumerism. Political parties across the spectrum are encouraged to seek bold new visions of hope and idealism.

The bishops defend the right of the Church to enter into the political arena: 'It is not possible to separate the way a person perceives his or her place in the created order from their beliefs, religious or otherwise, about how the world's affairs ought to be arranged.'

The letter recognises the danger in the current situation where people are disengaging from politics, arguing that restoring faith in both politicians and the political process requires a new politics that engages at both a deeper more local level within a wider, broader vision for the country as a whole.

In the letter, the bishops warn against despair and urge people to vote in the General Election: 'Unless we exercise the democratic rights that our ancestors struggled for, we will share responsibility for the failures of the political classes. It is the duty of every Christian adult to vote, even though it may have to be a vote for something less than a vision that inspires us.'

Green havens

South Hill Wood and Kingswood Glen are interesting and historic local havens for wildlife – and people! The Friends work with the council and other organisations to improve these important greenspaces.

Activities last year included a Bat and Moth Walk – another is planned for 2015. Friends have planted lots more bulbs to welcome Spring, with our bluebells. Projects include more work on their history – including the auxiliary hospital in the First World War. Highfield schoolchildren continue to enjoy the Wood and Glen in planned activities. We are developing a submission to the Heritage Lottery Fund for funding to restore historic features and vistas and generally to improve the Wood.

We are again running a Community Event - on Saturday 13th June, 2pm to 5pm, when there will be a performance by the jazzy part of the Bromley Youth Orchestra, entertainment for children and a 'Try Tennis' event. There will be more information in the next edition of SPAN.

Mission of the month

St. Christopher's Group

The St Christopher's Group comprises St Christopher's Hospice in Sydenham and St Christopher's Bromley in Orpington (previously Harris HospisCare). Both care for adults from the age of 18 years upwards.

St Christopher's Hospice in Sydenham has 48 beds on four wards providing in-patient medical and nursing care led by consultants in palliative medicine and experienced and specially qualified nurses. In addition, there is Home Care led by clinical nurse specialists in teams focused on each of Bromley, Croydon, Lambeth, Lewisham and Southwark. This catchment area covers 1.5 million people.

The Anniversary Centre offers a 'social hub' for patients and families, and includes a café with internet access, a rehabilitation gym, treatment rooms, a bathing suite, group rooms and a hairdressing salon. They offer a programme of social events which is also open to the general public.

There is also extensive planned day care and a range of supportive care services, inpatient and home care multi-professional teams that include social workers, chaplain and spiritual care lead, welfare advisers, psychiatrists, physiotherapists, occupational therapists and complementary and creative therapists.

The St Christopher's Candle Project is a specialist service for all bereaved children and their families, offering individual and group support. It works with more than 250 bereaved children and their families each year.

St Christopher's Bromley provides services across the borough, offering home care, day care and a specialist service to support patients with lymphoedema.

St Christopher's cares for over 2,500 adults each year. Each year they provide over 15,000 days of care on their wards and support around 2,400 people in their own homes.

It costs over £18 million a year to deliver all the services. Only about a third of this comes from the NHS. This means that they need to raise more than £12 million from supporters and the local community.
