More wartime memories

Having enjoyed David Loades' and Stan Clark's articles about their wartime child experiences, I thought I would make it a trio with my memories of World War 2.

I was six when war was declared. I remember when the siren was sounded my parents and I immediately put on our gas masks. This was the first and very probably the last time that we used them.

Early in the war a large house on the corner of Westmoreland Road and Hayes Lane Beckenham was bombed, killing two teenage sisters which I thought was tragic.

I remember cycling in Kenwood Drive and gazing up to the clear blue skies watching the Battle of Britain develop and then the collection of shrapnel.

I recollect two incidents involving damaged German bombers. The first roared over our house seemingly just missing the chimney pot. It crashed near Park Langley Golf Course. The second occasion was when a German plane flew so low over our garden that we could clearly see the pilot's face. I believe it was able to return to northern France safely.

I was not evacuated. My sleeping quarters were in a small cupboard underneath the stairs which was considered the safest place in the house. By the time the doodlebugs arrived we had a Morrison shelter installed in the dining room. This was an iron structure and whilst in there on one occasion a doodlebug exploded nearby, buckling the windows. I also remember while on the hill at Otford watching a doodlebug descending below us to explode on the railway line near the local station.

My last memory of the war was a happy one. My father took me to the Victory in Europe celebrations in London. It was a wonderful night which ended by our going to Waterloo to catch the train to Bournemouth to join the family for a holiday.

During Advent there are some special travellers journeying around Shortlands.

After a blessing in church on Advent Sunday, a knitted Mary, Joseph and their donkey will visit members of St Mary's congregation along with a flock of sheep. They will spend one night with each host family. The hosts then take them on to their next night's accommodation and they will be returned to the church for the Crib Service on Christmas Eve.

There is a short service with a prayer, hymn and lighting of a candle as they are passed on. The hosts usually offer some refreshment to those bringing the travellers, allowing an opportunity to meet and chat with other members of our congregation.

Some people invite neighbours and family members to join them as they receive the travellers into their home.

At this busy time of year it is a good way to pause and reflect on the true meaning of Christmas.

The Children's Society

The Children's Society is a leading national children's charity committed to making childhood better for all children in the UK. It provides vital help for tens of thousands of children every year.

There are four priority areas of work:

- Exposed to bullying, violence and deprivation, some children are driven to crime. The Children's Society seeks to provide preventative support and guidance to lead children away from the cycle of crime and custody.
- Each year in the UK 100,000 children run away from home, and many resort to begging, stealing and prostitution to survive. The Children's Society helps them find solutions to their problems at their point of greatest need.
- The Children's Society ensures that individual disabled children are given a voice in decisions that affect them now and in the future, to overcome the effects of exclusion, ignorance and disrespect.
- The charity is helping refugee children rebuild their lives in new communities, surrounded and supported by friends.
 Providing help with finding accommodation and education, and assisting with language barriers.

This forms the core of their work, and alongside this they also support projects involving traveller and gypsy children, and young people affected by adult drug and alcohol misuse. Work in children's centres, schools and churches gives children the chance to develop the skills and confidence they need to make the most of their childhood and play a full part in their local communities.

The Children's Society relies heavily on donations. This allows them to concentrate their work where the need is greatest and not just in areas where government funding is available.
