It was very fitting that Beryl's funeral was held at St. Mary's Shortlands even though for the past few years she had lived nearer to her daughter.

For most of her life Beryl lived in and around Shortlands. Her son was in the choir at St. Mary's and her daughter married here. She had been a worshipper with us for many, many years.

She met her first husband Jack through their mutual love of sport and the couple, who married in 1939, were to have two children: Susan and Andrew.

Always interested in her children and their lives, she gave them a loving and fulfilling childhood which they supposed to be the norm. It was only in later years they realised just how privileged they had been.

As her five grandchildren came along, she extended her interest to them and eventually was blessed with nine great grandchildren too.

Jack died in the mid-seventies and Beryl took up her interest in sport again. This led to her eventual second marriage to Tom and her embracing his family as well. Sadly, he was to die after only four years and once again she threw herself into family and sporting life.

Beryl had many hobbies. She loved all sports and was a fervent Arsenal supporter, she travelled extensively right into her late eighties and her garden was a delight as well.

A strong willed and gracious lady with a great sense of fun, she lived life to the full and this showed in the large number of people who attended her funeral to support her extensive family. A private Committal was held at Beckenham Crematorium led by Reverend Jane

Hilda was born just off the Old Kent Road and attended school in Ruby Street. She was a good student and a hard worker. On Christmas Day 1938 at the age of 21 she married her husband Alfred who she had met at the cinema and shortly after, because of the war, the family moved to the Tunbridge Wells area.

Like most people Hilda made the most of things during the war and went to work in a munitions factory before later moving to the Accounts Department of the GPO.

Her daughter Christine was born in 1947 and joined in 1953 by son Michael.

Not content with being 'just' a housewife, Hilda persuaded her husband to take on the corner shop in their village and they worked happily together, seven days a week, for many years enjoying the chatting and gossiping with their customers.

In retirement Hilda became a keen gardener and took up woodwork and pottery.

Hilda had managed to live independently for several years before her health deteriorated. She came to live with her daughter, and then in recent years she lived in Coloma Court where she was well looked after. Her long life meant that she outlived most of her peers, but all those who knew her when she was younger and full of energy have fond memories of a bouncy, energetic lady with a great sense of humour, a zest for life and a willingness always to try new things.

The funeral service was conducted by Reverend Jane Peters, at Beckenham Crematorium, on 17th January. Her family joined together to say goodbye to a much loved and respected person.

The Brown Years

The Reverend Charles Brown, who joined the family of the faithful in December, was an example of what many would aspire to be: a true Christian gentleman. His was the quiet, happy aura, and I recall on joining the St. Mary's family in the 1960s, that it was Charles, with others of the same ilk, including Paul Baker, who made me feel welcome, treating me immediately as one of the family. He and his wonderful wife Joyce, went on to take over the Children's Church. which I was to inherit in later years, and his house meetings were memorable and happy ones.

To folk such as Charles and Paul, the Christian faith was what it should be, a thing of joy and wonderment.

The Heating Saga - the end?

In February 2012 the boiler, which running within eight weeks. heats the water for the central heating in all the church buildings, burst. This was a disaster as we had a very cold February and March last year. After we established that the boiler could not be repaired we immediately started a fundraising programme to pay for a new boiler. At the same time we looked into the possibility of a temporary heating solution, but did not proceed as this was likely to cost as much as a new heating system!

We had to cancel the hall and meeting room lettings and move the Pre-school to the Scout Hut, which has electric heating. We then searched for a new heating system but found that before we could proceed with this we needed to remove asbestos from the boiler room. This was completed and the new boiler installed and commissioned by the end of March. So we were back up and

Once the fundraising was underway we went on to repair the heating system in church. It took some time to find engineers that had the necessary skills to repair the heaters. This work has now been completed and all the Church heaters are working. This took many months because we needed to maintain the heating in the Church Hall for the Pre-school and other Hall users - so we could only switch off the heating to carry out repairs during the holidays.

The final work was completed in February. We now have a much more efficient boiler and all the fan heaters in Church are working (two had been disconnected some years ago). However, the Church is a very large building and when the temperature outside is below zero, the heating system still struggles!

Let's pray that the heating is now safe for the foreseeable future!

Memories from East Africa

I thought readers of SPAN might be interested in some of my memories of working in East Africa in the mid-1980s. I had been seconded to work for the Foreign Office, helping to establish separate authorities in each of Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania for railways, harbours and other Government services.

During my time there, I visited 'Paxtu', near Nyeri. This was a cottage built for Lord and Lady Baden-Powell in 1938, and was a very comfortable bungalow. They named it 'Paxtu' - or 'Pax too' - after their home, Pax Hill, near Bentley in Hampshire. The cottage had a view of the twin, snow-covered peaks of Mount Kenya. I stayed at Tree Tops, and also the Outspan hotel, next to Paxtu: they were all built by the same man: Eric Walker. He had been a personal secretary to Lord Baden-Powell when the scouting movement was first established. and was one of the first two Scout Inspectors, with responsibility for the south of England. I liked the name for the hotel. 'Outspan' was a Boer word for unhitching the oxen after a hard day's work - so here it means 'taking a break and relaxing'. Each year, scouts and guides meet at the Outspan hotel to begin a



memorial parade and service for Lord Baden-Powell, who died at Paxtu in 1941. He was buried at the church in Nyeri following a full military funeral, having declined earlier to be buried in Westminster Abbey. In the church at Nyeri there are many gifts and memorials that scouts and guides have made through the years.

Lord Baden-Powell's gravestone has the Scout tracking symbol for 'Gone Home' - a circle with a black dot in the centre, which you can see from the photo.

Planning Ahead

The church council came together on a snowy January Saturday to plan ahead for the coming year. While we're looking forward to the arrival of our new vicar, we're also aiming to maintain momentum until they arrive.

We've achieved a lot in the last year: as well as having fun raising almost £47,000 for the heating appeal, and giving Canon Paul Miller a good send-off, we have also continued to do much mission and pastoral work in the community.

The meeting considered how we can all use the gifts we have been given in the service of St. Mary's and the community. There are many roles in the life of St. Mary's that individually don't take much time or effort – but added up, they make the difference. Having asked people to give their money last year, this year we are asking people to give their time and skills - such as cleaning, helping welcome people to services, or making coffee. All of these are vital to help St. Mary's run smoothly.

The meeting also considered how to support people who God may be calling, for example to help lead worship in church or in home groups, run activities for young people, or provide pastoral support to others. Training and support is there for those who are interested – and there are ways to get involved even if you have limited time to contribute.

The meeting agreed a number of actions to welcome new arrivals into the parish, to support and reach out to older and younger people, and to make greater use of the website and social media in future.

Mission of the Month The Whitechapel Mission

Whitechapel Mission provides a service provided for over 130 years. lifeline to people caught up in the cycles of poverty, hopelessness and dependencies of various kinds. It helps people help themselves, giving them confidence, independence and life skills. Its strapline is 'bringing hope where there is despair'.

The Mission is open 365 days a year providing around 300 vulnerable people every day with hot food, clothing, laundry, showers, counselling and medical care. Help with form filling, training, and putting people in the direction of hostels, recovery programmes, work, benefits, etc. are all part of the service. The Mission provides Severe Weather Emergency Provision which operates as soon as the

Founded in 1876, the temperature drops below 0°C, a

In the past year over 109,000 breakfasts were served, 463 people used the Mission as their regular postal address, £600,000 was spent on helping Londoners back on their feet, 2,800 used their advice services, 151 people found a hostel, I I 2 found a flat and 24,000 hours of volunteering were given by individuals, companies and churches.

All the funding needed for this vital work is received through voluntary donations, fundraising events, and donations given in kind. The Mission does not receive any Government funding.
