Moving forwards, shaped by the past

The period since I moved into the Vicarage has felt a strange time; a time of limbo in that I have been here yet have had a sense of not being here as I have had no role in church.

At times like this it is easy to feel restless and unsettled, particularly when you find yourself in unfamiliar surroundings without your usual landmarks and points of reference. Catching the train into London, it felt very strange looking out the window not recognising where I was, seeing different stations after my familiarity with the route from Liverpool Street, the District and Central lines.

The date of my collation service, 15 June, is also the day that the church remembers Evelyn Underhill. She wrote on prayer and the spiritual life, in particular Christian mysticism, in the early twentieth century.

Evelyn became known as a retreat director

and spiritual guide and was much associated with Pleshey, the retreat house of Chelmsford Diocese.

It struck me as a nice touch of serendipity that, as I formally leave Chelmsford Diocese to begin my ministry here at Shortlands in Rochester Diocese, there is a link. A date which has significance in one place will from now on have significance to me in another. It feels like a handing over from one chapter in my life to the next one.

I am aware how often in our lives we bring the past with us as we move forward into the future. We constantly move into the future but at the same time are shaped by our past.

Marilyn was born in Manchester, but grew up in Swansea where she acquired her Welsh accent. However due to her father's work she and her family travelled extensively, including living in Iran and Hong Kong.

Possibly it was this somewhat nomadic early life which set the pattern for her working life.

She went to work in the Foreign Office and managed to have some very desirable postings including Antigua and Paris. She loved to travel and returned to Antigua only last year. She was rightly very proud of her work and made many friends over the years. Her colleagues in many ways were as a family to her because she never married nor had children.

Perhaps for this reason, when her niece Sophie produced four little boys in fairly quick succession, she became a doting great aunt. She loved to hear what Charlie, Alfie, Stanley and Harrison were doing and what they were getting up to.

It was with a sense of shock that her family and close friends attended her funeral at Beckenham Crematorium on 31 May to say goodbye to a much loved sister, aunt, colleague and friend.



Karen Bigg

In May we learned of the death of Mrs Karen Bigg, Headteacher at Highfield Junior School: she had been ill for some time.

Karen was a highly dedicated Headteacher and she will be sadly missed by the school and by her friends and colleagues in the Highfield community. She was a calm, kind and caring person who placed children's learning and wellbeing at the centre of all decisions for the school.

Mrs Bigg was a part of the Highfield community for 13 years, starting at Highfield Junior School as the Deputy Headteacher in 2000. After taking up a headship in Medway for several years, she returned in September 2007, initially as Acting Headteacher. Soon afterwards, she became the permanent Headteacher.

Following Mrs Bigg's death, the pupils were all informed by their class teachers and shortly afterwards Reverend Jane Peters went into the school to take a whole school assembly.

Reverend Jane talked openly to them about death and how Mrs Bigg was now in a different place. While this was a sad occasion she also reminded them to think about all the good things that Mrs Bigg had done.

The school held a memorial service in St Mary's on 7 June so that the children and staff could celebrate her life and remember her. The next few months will be a difficult time for the school and so our thoughts and prayers are with them and of course with her family.

John Stevens

A memorial service was held at St Mary's to celebrate the life of John Stevens, who died in May aged 81 years. The service, and the funeral which preceded it, were taken by Canon Doug Redman.

John was known through the many years he served this community as the reliable, trusty and friendly proprietor of Jollye and Wood Estate Agents at Shortlands Station.

Born in 1931 at West Dulwich, John was evacuated during the War, but the family returned to Dulwich in 1945, when John left school and joined the Royal Navy. He served for seven years plus a further five in the reserve. He was a faithful supporter of the Royal Naval Association ever since, and their colours were paraded at his memorial service.

Whilst serving, the Stevens moved to Bidborough, near Tonbridge in Kent, where John returned 'on demob'. His main civilian role was with the Estate Agency, owned by his uncle but after a few years he handed over to John until he, in turn, sold the business in 1999, after nearly 40 years.

Tragically, John's partner, Iris, died in 1989, after 26 years together, through drowning while on holiday with a friend. John subsequently moved to a flat in Westfield Road Beckenham.

A very active Rotarian, John was also a member of Probus, assisted the Beckenham Blind Club, helped organise the British Legion Poppy Appeal, and was a member of the Constitutional Club and a local French Study Group. He had a large circle of friends, including the Rotary Club of Douai in France from which grew links with St Mary's. John will be greatly missed and long remembered.

Cubs win Cycling Competition

Banking on your support!

Bromley Foodbank is located at the United Reformed Church in central Bromley. An offshoot of Orpington Foodbank, it is less than a year old and is already supported with regular donations from 20 churches, including Anglicans, Methodists, Baptists, URC, Quakers, Free Church and Roman Catholics. Both are part of the Trussell Trust's national network of foodbanks, which experienced nearly three times the level of demand in 2012 than in 2011.

It is a remarkable place, a small warehouse filled with shelves, floor to ceiling, supporting plastic crates labelled 'Soup expires 2014' or 'Biscuits Oct-Dec 2013'. There is a minor army of helpers from every denomination, and many non-churchgoing volunteers too.

Some people access the Foodbank directly and referral vouchers are also given by advice services and other organisations. A three-day supply of food and basic toiletries is given, appropriate to each household's needs. Supplies are given to people experiencing a temporary financial crisis – on a maximum of three occasions only – they are not to regularly supplement income or benefits. Recipients are all ages, including working families and pensioners.

Those who visit the Foodbank to collect the food are often also referred by the volunteers to other sources of help, such as Citizen's Advice.

Although the Foodbank's stock is currently adequate, they have now reached the position where more food is being taken than received. The Foodbank is also about to take on two new challenges.

A Foodbank is to open in Penge, two or three days a week starting from scratch supported by Bromley Foodbank's stock. Additionally, the Pantry, run by Christ Church Anerley, already open once a week and funded solely by that church, is to become part of the Bromley Foodbank network supported by Bromley's stock.

So Foodbank needs donations now more than ever – please bring your non-perishable goods to the box at the back of the church.
