#### **Barry Farthing**

Barry was born in Beckenham, one of two children to George and Margaret. All his childhood was here. On leaving school he went to learn hairdressing and went to work for Graham Webb International becoming a top trophy winner there. Later he changed career and went from hairdressing to engineering working for Goodrow Engineering.

He met Margaret and on 16 August 1969 they were married. It was a good and happy marriage lasting 29 years until Margaret's sudden death in 1995. The couple had two daughters: Dawn and Lisa. Barry was a loving husband, a great dad and would later become a proud and interested grandfather.

After the untimely death of Margaret, Barry started to rebuild his life. He met Sue. Friendship grew into love and they spent the last 13 years in a happy and loving relationship together. His family grew when he and Sue's families came together. He was greatly loved by them all and an important part of all their lives, taking interest in Sue's children and grandchildren as well as his own.

In 2009 Barry became very ill and it's a tribute to his determination and love of his family that he pulled through. Sadly over the last 12 months his health deteriorated and, despite the wonderful care of the critical care doctors and nurses at Guy's, Barry lost his fight to live. He slipped away with all the family around him on 27 January.

A Service of Thanksgiving, conducted by Reverend Jane Peters, took place at Beckenham Crematorium on 17 February attended by family and many friends.

#### **Raymond Benfield**

Ray was born in Plaistow in 1924. He attended Priestmead Primary and then went to high school in Harrow. He began his career at Lloyds of London but when war intervened he served in the RAF where he qualified as a Pilot.

After the war he pursued a career

as a quantity surveyor. He met and married Edna and they moved to West Wickham. After a spell in Bahrain they settled in Shortlands where they lived from 1971. Edna passed away less than a year ago and Ray never really got over his loss. Ray loved music and played the piano. He enjoyed tennis and later took up golf. A Service of Thanksgiving to celebrate his life was conducted by Canon Paul Miller, at St. Mary's, Shortlands. Raymond's son John, and family and friends, paid tribute to his life. A private cremation followed at Beckenham Crematorium.



#### The Superwomen of Britain

The average granny babysits 42 times a year, and a quarter of grannies babysit every week.

What does all this childminding do for granny? Keeps her young! Grannies who care for grandchildren feel a whopping 14 years younger than their actual age.

# **'The Way I See it:** Back from the Dead?'

by Canon David Winter, a former Head of Religious Broadcasting at the BBC, considers the place of Easter in the Christian calendar. Christmas packs them in, but Easter, which falls this month, is undeniably the defining Christian festival. It was St Paul, no less, who set out the stark truth: 'If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile'.

Without the resurrection of Jesus which Easter celebrates, the whole Christian story collapses. He would simply take his place with all the other great religious teachers of history who died and are buried somewhere. But the Christian creeds are adamant: 'on the third day, he rose from the dead'. The resurrection is not, for Christians, an optional extra.

In the current western atmosphere of scepticism, that claim is regarded as self-evidently ridiculous. We all know what 'dead' means, whether it's a dead bird or flower or person. Death is the termination of life - as people say now, 'end of'. Many people are attracted to the teaching of Jesus, but they simply can't accept as credible the claim that he rose from the dead. They assume that the whole idea is the product of gullible minds. His followers wanted to believe that he was alive again, and simply talked themselves into believing that he was.

However, this scepticism about the resurrection of Jesus is itself the product of preconceived assumptions. The sceptics don't believe that Jesus rose from the dead and assume that it is self-evident that he didn't. In fact, their position is not based on evidence, but on an assumption that it simply couldn't have happened. Yet strangely enough, what evidence we have suggests very strongly that it did.

We can, for instance, be pretty clear about a number of facts - well established, incontrovertible facts. One is that lesus of Nazareth was a real person who lived in the early decades of the first century (as we call it). Another is that he was put to death by crucifixion during the period 26-37AD, when Pontius Pilate was the prefect of the Roman province of Judaea. Another is that by 70AD - within a life-time -Christianity was flourishing (though in places heavily persecuted) all over the Roman empire, and that its core belief was that Jesus had been raised

from the dead after his execution, and had appeared alive to anything up to 500 different people, in various places and on various occasions over a period of about forty days. Many of these witnesses (listed by the apostle Paul in his letter to Corinth written in about 55AD, just twenty years or so after the event) were still alive as he wrote - they could speak for themselves!

It shouldn't, surely, be hard for a regime as efficient and ruthless as the Roman empire to prove that a wandering Jewish preacher they had executed had remained dead. Yet it did prove impossible, to the point that Christianity eventually became the official religion of the empire.

Were those gullible times? No, they weren't. One of the two leading Jewish schools of thought, the Sadducees, didn't believe in the resurrection of the dead, and neither did one of the leading schools of thought in the Greco-Roman empire of the time, the Stoics. The characters in the Gospels, friends of Jesus or his enemies, reacted exactly as you or I would - it can't happen. The story of 'doubting' Thomas, one of the disciples of Jesus, is evidence that even among his closest followers there was a reluctance to believe the evidence of their own eyes.

No, they weren't gullible, but they became completely convinced. Ten of the twelve apostles probably died for that conviction. You've got to be pretty sure of something to do that. When we sing 'Jesus Christ is risen today' on Easter morning, it's a lot more than a pious wish!

Psychological therapy programmes are also offered in partnership with Bromley Healthcare to help young people recover from anxiety or depression.
