

Sharing and caring

We recently celebrated Harvest in church and the children from local nursery schools visited to sing songs, present their gifts and hear a story. We thought about how there is plenty for everyone if we learn how to share. I told the story of Stone Soup and the children helped me act it out.

It begins like all good stories: Once upon a time....

A man was riding his horse which stumbled over a rock sticking out of the ground. He dug it out and put it in his pocket so no one else would get hurt.

He soon arrived in a village. People stared at him, watching out of their windows but no one spoke. He asked a woman if he could have some food as he was hungry. She replied that there had been a poor harvest and they didn't have enough. He asked others and each gave a similar reply.

He felt sorry for them; they were as hungry as he was. He told the villagers: 'Your worries are over. I have a special stone that will help take you through the long winter. With it you can make stone soup: it not only feeds hungry people but brings people together'.

He filled a pot with water and started a fire. He added the stone to the pot and asked for a carrot, then an onion, someone brought a potato and others a turnip and herbs. Soon there was a wonderful smell from the pot. The villagers brought tables and chairs out, bowls and spoons and everyone ate until they were full. Someone got their fiddle out and they sang and danced for the rest of the evening before going to bed feeling content and well fed.

The next morning as the traveller said goodbye he was reminded about his stone. He replied 'You need it more than me - as long as you have it you will never be hungry'.

The story of Stone Soup is a story about sharing and caring when blessings seem scarce. The stone brings people closer together, and feeds those who are hungry.

Looking forward to Christmas

In addition to the regular Sunday morning services, they will be singing in most of the special services during Advent and Christmas. We are very proud of all that they achieve and grateful for their commitment to the choir.

Of course, children and young people play an important part in the life of St Mary's not only at Christmas, but all year round. They meet most Sunday mornings in their Junior Church groups, beginning and finishing with the adults in the 10.30am service. Numbering around 45 in total, some come often, some occasionally; each one is a special part of our church family.

My day job

Many of you know me as the large, loud, bearded bass singer. This is a little about what I do when I'm not in church.

I originally studied Psychology, involving visits to large Victorian-built mental health institutions, but graduated during the major



recession of the late 70's/ early '80s. Having run a fruit and veg stall whilst at University proved more useful than my degree, in that I ended up on a management training scheme with Sainsbury's.

After a number of years working in the stores they moved me into training and paid for me to gain my Personnel qualifications. I ended up as Head of Retail Recruitment.

I then worked for three consultancy firms providing Human Resources (HR) advice to a wide range of organisations and supporting a development initiative - 'Investors in People'.

Over the last 16 years I have held a number of senior HR and general management posts including being Chief Executive of two small mental health charities in north London.

I now work four days a week for an Arm's Length Body of the Home Office. My day to day work involves interpreting the policies that apply to a large government department and applying them to a relatively small organisation of 200-220 staff. For me it is about how I ensure that managers treat staff fairly (and legally) whilst ensuring tax-payers get value for money.

My fifth day is used as a trustee of Community Options, a charity which inspires and enables people with mental health needs to lead valued and meaningful lives in the community.

My main hobby is singing, of which the choir at St Mary's forms a major part.

Mission of the month

Toilet Twinning

The fact that one in three people across the world do not have somewhere safe to go to the toilet in 2017 is appalling. Bad sanitation is one of the world's biggest killers: it affects women, children, the old and the sick the hardest. Every minute a child under the age of five dies because of dirty water and poor sanitation and around half the people in the world have an illness caused by bad sanitation.

Not only is there the risk of disease but many women and girls are vulnerable to being attacked as they walk to the edge of their community to go to the toilet in the open or late at night. Many girls drop out of school because the school either does not have a toilet, ordoes not have a separate toilet for boys and girls.

There is something we can do about it. Toilet twinning is a scheme run by the charity Tear Fund: a donation of £60 can build a toilet where it is needed. Local people are involved by donating materials and building it; they are also trained in hygiene and how to look after the toilets.

Here at St Mary's we have seven toilets: some have already been twinned with donations given to build toilets in Africa and Asia. Our aim is that we will twin all of our toilets and hopefully more beyond,

As we are coming up to Christmas you could give twinning a toilet as a gift to someone who already has one.

Allhallowtide

The first week in November has always been a time for celebrations marking the end of Harvest and the beginning of winter. It is also a time for remembering those who have died.

Allhallowtide starts on the evening of 31 October with All Hallows Eve or Halloween as we know it better today. Then comes All Saints Day on 1 November, and All Souls Day on 2 November.

Halloween has its origins in pagan festivals held around the end of October in Great Britain. People believed that, at this time of year, the spirits of dead people could come 'alive' and walk among the living. They thought that it was important to dress up in costumes when venturing outside, to avoid being harmed by these spirits, thus possibly giving rise to the Halloween costumes worn these days.

A popular game at Halloween is apple bobbing, perhaps a reminder of the time when women accused of witchcraft in the Middle Ages were tried, using ducking stools. Others think that apple bobbing is a way for young people to predict who they will marry or whether their partner is faithful!

Some aspects of the modern Halloween celebrations, such as carving lanterns out of vegetables, originated long ago. The custom of trick or treating goes back to at least the 16th century but has only recently become such a commercial and overt practice.

All Saints Day is an opportunity for believers to remember all saints and martyrs, known and unknown, throughout Christian history. It has been a Christian tradition since the 4th century to remember all martyrs, but it was Pope Gregory IV in the year 835 who established the day to remember all saints.

The next day is All Souls Day. It purposely follows All Saints Day to shift the emphasis from the saints and martyrs who are in heaven to all those who have died.

There will be a memorial service at St Mary's at 4.00pm on Sunday 5th November to remember our loved ones who have died.
