

Hilda Judge

Hilda, known to all as Judgy, was born in Sunderland in 1911, where she grew up.

On leaving school she went into service and then to work in a children's home.

She married John and they moved south to Deptford and had four children.Tragically Jean died aged only 2. Peter and Derek died aged 18 and 21 respectively and within a month of each other – both in motor bike accidents.

Keith, her youngest child died seven years ago having been unwell for much of his life. But he married Cathy and gave Judgy three grandsons: Wayne, Cy and Clay and two great grandchildren: Charlie and Brooke.

Judgy worked hard all her life and retired at the age of 66, finishing her working life as a housekeeper at Bromley Hospital. She was very proud of her independence and her hobbies included bingo, reading and her family.

Marian Steadman

Marian was born at the Maternity Home in Bromley in 1951. She was educated first at Hayes Primary School, later at Hayes Secondary and then at Buller's Wood.

She left school and among other hobbies took up ballroom dancing and it was there she met David whom she married in 1972.

Before her children arrived Marian worked as a PA. Later she worked as a teacher at a nursery school and after the children had grown up she became a dental nurse.

She took up playing the violin at the age of 30, taking every opportunity to play: trios, quintets

and with the Bromley Symphony Orchestra. Her other hobbies included walking, cycling, tennis and the sea.

She had recently come to find St. Mary's a good place to be. As her illness became harder, she found solace in being in the chapel and began to try to understand where God was in her suffering. She was quite sure he was with her. As a result of her thinking more deeply about her faith she joined the Confirmaton Class at St. Mary's with a view to being confirmed in the Christian faith at the end of January. It became clear that things were not going as she and her family hoped. We asked the Bishop of Tonbridge if he would confirm her and he came to St. Christopher's Hospice to meet her and confirm her. It was a great joy to be able to give Marian Communion a few hours before she died.

lames Langstaff was welcomed and inaugurated as the 107th Bishop of Rochester on I I December.

On a bitterly cold morning , 1400 people travelled through the snows of Kent to our cathedral. The service was a wonderful mixture of church and state pageantry combined with personal touches as both civic leaders and church members gave prayer and welcome. The occasion revealed the best of the Church of England.

As Bishop James knocked on the Great West door, a fanfare sounded and sunlight streamed in. During the service the Bishop was given his mandate and symbols of office. He was welcomed by the civic leaders and by organisations across the Diocese.

Bishop lames sermon was on the theme of the abundance and generosity of God's love, he challenged us to respond in our lives to match that generosity in our relationships with others. The hymn following the address had been specially written by the Bishop and focused on God's love to his people, with the chorus line "O lavish love poured ever free to heal and save humanity".

At the end of the service all were to stay in the Cathedral and meet fellow Christians, as under each seat was a donated lunch box. 1400 people became as one, meeting old friends and making new friends. That day, to quote the words of the hymn of Rochester diocese was "God's family ablaze with fire divine."

We will be welcoming Bishop James to St Mary's later in the year .

Mission of the Month Biggin Hill Romania Group

The Biggin Hill Romania Group was formed as a result of a television appeal in 1990. The previous year saw the end of Nicolae Ceausescu's repressive regime, and the rest of the world finally saw the truth of the country's poverty and suffering. This was expressed in no small part in the faces of around 150,000 Romanian orphans who were living in deprived conditions.

Initially the BHRG intended to relieve the distress of the sick and disabled children, but its work moved on to include distributing aid to hospitals, dental surgeries, schools and churches. In 1997 the group opened the Robert Cole Centre in Comanesti, in north east Romania, for children with special needs. More than 70 children attend regularly as well as others from mainstream schools who come for physiotherapy and speech therapy. The Centre's aim is to help each child reach his or her potential, as well as to encourage their acceptance by wider society.

In 2007 the new Foundations for Life Centre was opened on the first floor of the Robert Cole centre. This vocational and life skills centre has been created to help the first "graduates" of the centre who are now reaching 20 years of age.

St. Mary's has been supporting the work of the BHRG for some years. The annual family and shoe box appeal takes place in the Autumn. Gift boxes are transported directly to Comanesti to be distributed amongst the most needy, including many Roma children who would otherwise receive nothing at Christmas.
