Sarah Marie Roberts

Marie was born in Brynamman, Carmarthenshire. She was an only child and her mother died when she was young.

She met Marcel in 1939 and they married in 1942 in Porth in the Rhondda Valley. They had a son, James, who died in 2008, three grandsons, Paul, Mark and Adam, and one great-grandchild. They were married for sixty-eight years and for the last twenty years, after Marie suffered a stroke, Marcel was her dedicated carer.

By profession she was a teacher her last post being at the Valley Primary School. She loved needlework and especially quilting.

A Service of Thanksgiving, conducted by Canon Paul Miller, took place at Beckenham Crematorium followed by cremation and was attended by Marcel, her husband, Sheila, her daughter-in-law and her grandsons, as well as friends and neighbours. The hymns at the service were Calon Lan and Cwm Rhonda.



Gordon Smith

Gordon Smith was born in 1923 in Streatham the younger brother to Derek and Rodney.

At the age of just one his mother died. She was just forty-three years old. Her younger sister, having no children of her own brought the boys up. She was later to marry their father.

The family moved to Herne Bay where Gordon spent his early school years and in 1934 the family moved to Hayes, Kent from where Gordon attended Haberdasher's Askes.

Further tragedy was to overtake the young family when his father collapsed and died in 1936.

On leaving school Gordon was employed by the National Provincial Bank until he was called up to serve in the Second World War. He was drafted into REME – the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers and his postings included Holland and Sicily where he was engaged in building bridges. On demob, Gordon rejoined the Bank, this time working in the New Bond Street branch until his retirement, reaching the position of Chief Cashier.

His main hobby was gardening. He achieved great results with vegetables and even when he moved to Caton Court – his final home – he continued to tend the flower beds. He also loved to holiday abroad and was only stopped by an unfortunate motor car accident and the onslaught of Parkinson's Disease.

Gordon felt the loss of his brother Derek, with whom he lived, very keenly. They used to do so much together. Over the last few years his world became smaller and he became very depressed, but he was always glad to see people who popped in, and remained interested in the world around him. He was always a joy to visit.

What would you ask God for?

If you could ask God one question, and knew he'd answer it, what would it be? When a church in Cheltenham invited its congregation to do just that, the minister was startled to receive 423 responses – all questions. The top three were: Why does God allow suffering? Why am I here? What happens when I die? These were then made into widely announced sermon topics, which drew 25 visitors the first Sunday.

The mathematics of riding your bike

Do you feel confident on a bicycle? Although most children of 10 can ride one, it seems that the skill involved is actually extremely complicated.

After three years of research, scientists in universities in England, Holland and the US have come up with the mathematical formula that describes riding a bicycle. It covers such factors as inertia, gyroscopic and centrifugal forces as well as gravity, has 31 numbers and symbols, and nine sets of brackets.

Basically, the equation boils down to this: inertia forces + gyroscopic forces + the effects of gravity and centrifugal forces = the leaning of the body and the torque applied to the handlebars of a bike.

Or - put more simply: if you don't pedal fast enough to keep moving while keeping the bike straight, you fall over. (Most of us learned that the hard way!)

Whose fault is it, anyway?

In a small town a businessman put in planning permission to build a nightclub complete with dancing girls. The local church started a vigorous campaign to block it from opening. The church launched a petition and held prayers in public. Work progressed, however, right up until the week before opening. Then one night a bolt of lightning strike hit the nightclub and it burned to the ground. The church members were rather smug after that, until the nightclub owner sued them all - on the grounds that they were responsible for the fire. Loudly protesting their total non-involvement and innocence, the church members were all taken to court. As the case began, the judge looked over the paperwork and observed: "I don't know how I'm going to decide this. It appears that we have a nightclub owner who believes in the power of prayer, and an entire church congregation that doesn't!"

Mission of the Month

The Mothers' Union is a Christian organisation, founded in 1878 by Mary Sumner, the wife of a Hampshire clergyman and mother of three. She believed in the importance of family life and so set up a group to help women prepare for motherhood and meet the spiritual as well as physical needs of their children.

From this small beginning the Mothers' Union has grown into a worldwide organisation of some 3.6 million members in 78 countries, with its headquarters in London. Membership is open to men and women, single or married, and here at St Mary's there are 34 members who meet monthly.

While the values and aims of the Mothers' Union remain the same, to demonstrate Christian faith in action through the nurturing of the family in its many forms, the work undertaken has developed over time. This is partly a reflection of the many changes in society. While some paid workers are employed, the majority of the work is undertaken by volunteers.

The money raised during this month will go towards projects providing short and long term support to individuals, families and communities in the UK and abroad, as well as emergency relief

In the UK the Mothers' Union is involved in prison visiting, running courses in marriage preparation and support, as well as separation and divorce recovery. It helps families in need to have a holiday, and runs play schemes and child contact centres. Abroad, one of the Mothers' Union's most important projects is the running of language and development programmes in parts of Africa. Course participants, especially women, are helped to become literate and numerate, which has positive implications for their families. There are also small farming initiatives, and at the moment, emergency relief in Kenya because of drought conditions.

The funds received through the Mission of the Month initiative will surely be put to good use.

OberammergauPassion Play seen by ½ million people





The Passion Play in Oberammergau, southern Germany, has once again taken place honouring the vow the villagers first made in I 633. After the 30 years war, the Black Death reached Oberammergau in I 632. By October I 633 80 deaths had been recorded and the villagers made a vow that if they were spared further deaths they would perform the Passion of our Lord. The first play took place in I 634 and this year saw the 41st - it is now performed every ten years. To be in the play you must have been born in the village or have lived there for twenty years. This year one hundred and twenty performances of the play took place - it lasts five hours. People seeing the play usually combine it with a holiday and Canon Paul took a party of fortyfour people, many of whom came from Shortlands. They stayed in the delightful Austrian alpine village of Maria Alm.
