At the end of January we had a visitor in the parish office - a very friendly cat. It had spent time greeting the children as they arrived for pre-school and then found a warm radiator in the office. Perhaps it had read last month's article about our office team! We were concerned as no one recognised it as one of the local cats, but it was obviously well looked after. A bit of detective work resulted in his being returned home.

Many of us have experienced times in our lives when we feel we have wandered too far from home and feel lost. Sometimes this may mean small changes to our lifestyle in order to return home. For others a much more dramatic change is needed.

You may have sung the hymn 'Amazing Grace'. This tells something of the author's journey from a young man involved in the slave trade to a Christian minister who spoke out about the wrongs of slavery. We hear of the realisation that he had not been living well and that the grace of God would allow him to be brought back into the fold. The hymn moves from confession to an acceptance of faith and continues by considering the goodness still to come.

I think this shows us that, whatever we have done in our lives, forgiveness and redemption are possible and that we can all build a new relationship with God.

Some people are uncertain about attending church as they feel it will be full of 'good' people whereas it is full of people who have struggled or continue to struggle with all sorts of sins. Being a Christian doesn't mean that we are perfect but does mean that we recognise our shortcomings, try and turn away from them and to be Christ-like.


come for all or part of this time. We will be decorating eggs as well as some other Easter crafts and do hope that you will be able to join us.

#### JusB

JusB youth centre was started in 2003 by the family worker from St Mary's Church, College Road who met young people in Bromley who had nowhere to go, were not particularly interested in church yet needed support. They wanted somewhere to "jusb themselves".

JusB was born and moved into College Road in 2005. Since then it has worked with thousands of young people giving them support and providing activities. Its mission is 'to serve young people by accompanying them through thick and thin on their journey to independence'.

JusB helps young people aged 10 - 23 during both term time and school holidays. This work includes advice and guidance to help them find a job or stay on in education. There is also a homework club and projects to help develop new skills like urban music, craft, cookery and video animation. Young people are encouraged to support each other and be good ambassadors in their community.

#### **Combating poverty and hunger**

Bromley Borough Foodbank (BBF) wishes to thank supporters at St Mary's Shortlands for their support both financially and in food donations during 2016. Foodbank have also appreciated all the extra volunteers who have helped at various events during the year.

This year saw the introduction of a collection for financial donations outside Cannon Street Station in addition to regular Summer and Christmas food collections outside the larger Tesco stores. Local supermarkets also have donation boxes throughout the year. Church collections continue to play a large part in the donation of food and toiletries as well as providing the backbone of support workers and street collection volunteers.

Last November, Bromley Borough Foodbank was relaunched as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation. From its inception six years ago as an arm of the Oak Community Church in Orpington, BBF has grown to six centres across the borough, so it was vital to sustain the work by becoming an autonomous charity.

BBF provides three days' nutritionally balanced emergency food, advice and support to local people who are referred to them in crisis. It's part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK.

Donations of toiletries, nappies and household goods are particularly requested.

#### Mothering Sunday – 26 March

Mothering Sunday always falls on the fourth Sunday in Lent. Once observed as a day on which people would visit their "mother" church, it has become an occasion for honouring the mothers of children and giving them presents.

During the sixteenth century people returned to their mother church, either the main church of the area or the church where they were baptised. Anyone who did this was commonly said to have gone "a-mothering". In later times, Mothering Sunday became a day when domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mother church, usually with their own mothers and other family members. It was often the only time that whole families could gather together.

Children and young people who were 'in service' (as household servants) were given a day off on that date so they could visit their families. The children would pick wild flowers along the way to place in the church or give to their mothers.

In the USA in the early twentieth century, a movement started campaigning for an official day to honour mothers. In 1914 President Woodrow Wilson officially set Mothers' Day on the second Sunday in May. Mothers' Day is celebrated around the world at different times of year, from the second Sunday in February in Norway to 22nd December in Indonesia.

Eventually, the religious tradition evolved into the Mothering Sunday secular tradition of giving gifts to mothers.

In some churches in Lent one additional candle is added each week to those burning in church. These are purple to mirror the liturgical colour of Lent. But on the fourth Sunday it is pink (rose) to recognise Mothering Sunday.

At St Mary's, Mothering Sunday is celebrated by posies being distributed at the 10.30 service, for children to give to their mothers.
