Douai weekend



A group of 24 Guides, Young Leaders and Leaders accompanied the 26 parishioners that went to Douai with an exciting programme for the Saturday evening. An invitation had been received from a group of Guides camping in the grounds of a chateau at Givenchy-le-Noble, about an hour's drive from Douai. The theme of the camp was the royal courts of Europe, and we were asked to portray one of these - so we all dressed up as characters from the court of Henry VIII. We enjoyed a meal of couscous which they had cooked on a wood fire, followed by home-made cakes our Guides had brought to share with them as dessert. The evening ended with French and English Guides singing songs together around the campfire, a great example of international Guiding friendship showing how we all belong to the same world-wide family. The Guides then swapped email addresses and Facebook details before we returned to Douai for our sleepover with French Guides from another group who were not involved with the camp.

The two things which made the biggest impression on the English Guides were the fact that the "toilettes" in camp were simply "a la nature", ie find a friendly bush, which was a new experience for most of them! Also the wouldbe illegal immigrant who stowed away under our coach hanging onto the drive shaft at Cite Europe in the hopes we were returning to the UK. He emerged when we arrived in Douai, covered in oil and very disappointed to have travelled all that distance in the wrong direction!

Parishioners were hosted in various homes with wonderful French hospitality and we shared on the Sunday in an impressive Mass at which Canon Paul gave the Address. This was followed by lunch in the local school during which we enjoyed another gastronomic feast with plenty of French wine!

'Our link grows ever stronger and we have so many good friends in Douai' commented Canon Paul.

Ann now begins her 4th year of office and David begins his 1st; SPAN caught up with him and asked him how he felt to be elected:


'It is an honour and privilege to be appointed as a Churchwarden and to help St. Mary's to bring the love of God into the lives of all who live in Shortlands.

Pre-School awarded ICA

In March St Mary's Pre-school Shortlands was awarded ICAN Early Talk Accreditation. This means that the pre-school meets the standards set for promoting the development of speech, language and communication in children and shows good practice in identifying and referring children with speech, language and communication difficulties.

"I am very proud of the hard work all the pre-school staff put in to enable us to achieve this standard" said Pat Chase, the pre-school leader. "Two assessors spent an entire morning watching and listening to the staff as they interacted with the children, and a large portfolio of evidence was put together."

The pre-school is currently full, with 83 children on the register, and has a waiting list.



A Palestinian musician, Basel Zayed, will commence his training in London in September to become Palestine's first music therapist. Born in Jerusalem, where he still lives, Basel, when qualified, will return to work at the SOS Children's Village, Bethlehem.

Basel recently visited Shortlands whilst he was in London for his auditions and popped into St. Mary's Annual Parochial Church Meeting. He introduced himself and then played the oud, a Middle Eastern instrument. He was warmly received.

He has been offered places at both the Guildhall School of Music and Nordoff-Robbins Music Therapy Centre. Commenting on these offers, Canon Paul Miller said: 'Basel has done amazingly well to be offered places at these prestigious training schools, and we are delighted for him! It's a really exciting project.'
