# After the Olympic adrena

THE COLLECTIVE sense of achievement after the winning of an Olympic medal is a strange phenomenon. Despite the obviously individual nature of the triumphs, often in disciplines or crafts hardly ever seen by the general public, let alone participated in by them, there was none-the-less a resurgence of national pride as each of "our" medals was won. Such pride nowadays attaches to little other than sporting events, and that only rarely. The emotion was partly disinterested, as spectators cheered young athletes who strove to do the best they could. But the same strength of feeling was not directed towards weightlifters from Belarus, for example. This suggests that another motivation was a desire to feel part of the

distance from Beijing.

This has a beneficial side to it. The justification for so much investment in élite sport is the ability of athletes to inspire others to become involved.

This includes not just potential Olympic hopefuls, still in their childhood or early teens, but adults. too, for whom a body that works marginally better than before is reward enough. The eagerness of commercial firms to buy the endorsement of medal-holders is testament to the draw of successful sportsmen and women. The athletes spoke repeatedly about being inspired by predecessors. They will, in turn, inspire others. In this way sporting prowess is built, almost generation by generation

And there is one sense in which national team, albeit at a considerable each victory is a communal act, and

that is in the matter of funding. The extraordinary successes of the cycling team, for example, would not have been possible without the Manchester velodrome to practise in and the £22 million Lottery grant with which to hone the bikes and the riders. The athletes provide the innate talent and commitment; the public provides the conditions in which that talent can be shaped into something unbeatable. The result is that the athletes, certainly, have expressed a strong sense of competing for their country, not for themselves

There must always be an ambivalence about competitiveness. The Olympic Games are sold as a great unifying event; but when From an article in the Church Times hockey players are upended, and footballers are hacked down, the

winner-takes-all environment needs occasionally to be questioned. It is hard to see Olympic boxing, for example, as an encouragement to universal peace and harmony. Christ was born into a people with more national pride than any. His decision to spend time with losers, therefore. and his habit of telling tales about virtuous foreigners, were even more radical than they appear today. There is no adrenalin-rush associated with following Christ's example and helping the poor, but the influence for good that grows from such acts is more powerful — and often more demanding — than anything seen in Beijing during the past summer.
