

Fhe death of a hero

A hero of mine died in February, he was 99 years of age, and I saw him at Wembley Stadium in the 1950s. I was a young boy in an estimated crowd of 120,000 people! He wasn't a football legend, but in his lifetime he appeared before over 200 million people. His name was Dr Billy Graham and he was a renowned preacher and evangelist.

Some while ago he made this comment: 'If one day they tell you Billy Graham is dead, don't believe a word of it... I will be more alive than ever'. This is of course at the heart of the Christian faith, the belief that death is not the end of life, but a new beginning. We believe it to be true because Jesus was raised from the dead 2,000 years ago - Billy Graham's and every Christian's hero. This is our Easter faith.

Billy Graham was also a very humble man. His son once asked him what he would like inscribed on his gravestone. His reply was just the one word 'Preacher'. He was proud to be a preacher of Good News.

I seem to remember that day long ago when he was preaching at Wembley Stadium and he repeated over and over again the words 'God loves you!' He meant everyone there, individually and personally. Now this is the best news!

I wonder what one-word inscription you would like on your gravestone? This is a difficult one, so I will close with a longer inscription that I saw on holiday some years ago. It was on a memorial to the "Ash" family:

Ashes to ashes, dust to dust. In God alone the Ashes trust.

- **13.** When you finally reach the last piece, don't be sad. Rejoice in the masterpiece you've made and enjoy a well-deserved rest.

What is Fair Trade?

In short, fair trade is about doing things right, addressing the global imbalance of power and treating growers and artisans as equals. Fair trade stands for paying them a fair price, giving them decent access to markets by bypassing corrupt local businesses and shady government officials.

It's about fighting discrimination, looking out for child welfare and ensuring that the producers have access to safe working conditions and protecting their environment. It's about giving artisans and growers a voice and listening to that voice

By buying fairtraded goods you give the producers the dignity and justice they deserve so they can feed their families, improve their living conditions, send their children to school and above all have hope in the future.

As a Christian I find the opportunity to give this dignity and justice to my fellow human beings a very important part of living in a Christian way of life.

St Mary's Shortlands is a 'Fair Trade Church': this means whenever possible we serve fairtraded refreshments. We support fair trade fortnight: this year we had a lovely morning with the Craft and Chatter Group having a 'Big Brew' with home-made cakes, a quiz, videos of the work Traidcraft does and goods from the new spring catalogue.

We have a monthly Fair Traded goods stall at the back of the church after the 8am and 10.30am Sunday services (see the noticeboards for dates). There are also catalogues in the church porch that you can pick up any time with my details and how to make an order or you can shop at <u>www.traidcraft.org.uk</u>

We buy all our goods from Traidcraft plc: all their products are certified Fairtraded by The Fair Trade Foundation, an independent third party. We also support Traidcraft Exchange, the charity side of Traidcraft that does vital work lobbying governments, supporting and educating producers on improving their products and helping them gain access to markets.

On our doorstep

Have you seen what's happening at Beckenham Place Park recently?

For the first time in decades, the mansion house is open daily to the public as an arts, cultural and community centre. The building now houses artists' studios, arts and crafts classes, pilates and yoga classes and a café. There is a programme of special events throughout the year.

The park itself is also undergoing a number of improvements. Major landscaping plans have been developed, and tree felling and lake excavations have already started.

A successful bid has been made to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a project which will including rebuilding the stable block – you can keep up to date on progress and what's planned at the website of the Friends of Beckenham Place Park - <u>www.beckenhamplaceparkfriends.org.uk</u>. They also have a Visitor Centre in the mansion house, open from 1.30 to 3.30pm on Sunday afternoons.

Mission of the month

Kent, Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance Trust

This is a life-saving charity which provides a Helicopter Emergency Service (HEMS). It operates twenty-four hours, seven days a week, responding to the needs of critically ill or injured people in the region. When necessary, the medical crews can provide emergency, specialised treatment by taking the Accident and Emergency facilities of a hospital to the scene. The patient can then be airlifted direct to hospital.

The Trust operates two helicopters, one from the Marden base in Kent during daylight hours and the other from the Redhill base in Surrey, operating a twenty-four hour service. These ensure that no-one in the region is more than twenty minutes away from its life-saving services.

In 1989 the South East Thames Air Ambulance Team became the Kent Air Ambulance and then, in 2007, it expanded to include Surrey and Sussex. The Sussex Police donated a traffic patrol vehicle in 2009 to operate as a rapid response car in the event of the helicopters being grounded. When the Trust took receipt of a new, night-capable aircraft, the Surrey and Sussex wing moved to their current base at Redhill. This was the first twenty-four hour HEMS in the UK.

As a registered charity the Trust relies almost entirely on donations. It has to raise in excess of $\pounds 6.5$ million per year to fund the service which, to date, has helped in over 25,500 incidents. The Trust is committed to being available to everyone living, working or travelling in its region.
