

Learning about other faiths Eid al-Adha 22 August - Islam

Eid al-Adha or 'Feast of the Sacrifice' is the second of two Islamic holidays celebrated worldwide each year and is considered the holier of the two. It honours the willingness of Ibrahim (Abraham in the Bible) to sacrifice his son, as an act of obedience to God's command. Before Abraham sacrificed his son, God provided a male goat to sacrifice instead. This story is also found in the Jewish Torah and the Christian Old Testament (Genesis 22). Eid al-Adha also marks the end of the annual Hajj pilgrimage to Mecca. The Hajj is an annual pilgrimage to the holiest city for Muslims, and a mandatory religious duty that must be carried out at least once in their lifetime by all adult Muslims who are physically and financially capable of undertaking the journey and can support their family during their absence.

Rosh Hashanah (Jewish New Year) 10-11 September – Judaism

Rosh Hashanah is the first of the Jewish High Holy Days specified by Leviticus 23:23-32, which usually occur in the early autumn of the Northern Hemisphere. Rosh Hashanah is a two-day celebration, beginning on the first day of Tishrei: the first month of the Jewish civil year, but the seventh month of the ecclesiastical year. Rosh Hashanah marks the anniversary of the creation of Adam and Eve, the first man and woman according to the Hebrew Bible, and their inauguration of humanity's role in God's world. Customs include sounding the shofar (a hollowed-out ram's horn), as prescribed in the Torah, following the prescription of the Hebrew Bible to 'raise a noise' on Yom Teruah, attending synagogue services and reciting a special liturgy about teshuva (or repentance), as well as enjoying festive meals. Eating symbolic foods such as apples dipped in honey is now a tradition, hoping thereby to evoke a 'sweet new year'.

Yom Kippur (Day of Atonement) 19 September – Judaism

Yom Kippur, also known as the Day of Atonement, is the holiest day of the year in Judaism. Its central themes are atonement and repentance. Jewish people traditionally observe this day with an approximate 25-hour period of fasting and intensive prayer, often spending most of the day in synagogue services. It is also customary to refrain from using perfume, lotions or creams, from washing, and from wearing leather shoes. It is followed by a festive meal. Traditionally, Yom Kippur is considered to be the date on which Moses received the Ten Commandments. It occurred following the completion of 40 days of instructions from God. At this same time, the Israelites were granted atonement for the sin of idolising the Golden Calf.

Missions of the months

Welcare in Bromley

Welcare in Bromley is a local social work organisation working with vulnerable families, supporting those with children between the ages of 8 to 13. The core services continue to be 1:1 individual emotional support and advice, group work programmes for parents and group work for children who have witnessed domestic violence. This case study illustrates how effective this work can be (names have been changed).

Cassandra and her 11 year old son Nathan had moved away from Nathan's father who had been violent towards Cassandra and had physically chastised Nathan. Nathan was often very angry and would start fights with other children at school and was verbally abusive to his mum at home. Cassandra had low self-esteem and needed help with enforcing boundaries for Nathan.

Cassandra and Nathan said that the situation has improved as a result of a series of 1:1 sessions with a Welcare family support worker. They both stated that their relationship is now calmer and Cassandra said that she feels better equipped to understand Nathan's behaviour and can help him. Nathan's teacher has also commented on how his behaviour has become more manageable.

In the last year Welcare in Bromley worked with 46 families with 91 children. There were 4 volunteers working with young people. Medecins Sans Frontieres – Doctors without Borders

Between 18 February and 3 March 2018 government forces in Syria began an intensive military offensive to retake the besieged East Ghouta enclave. Weeks of bombing and shelling caused widespread destruction. Each day more than 70 people were killed and many more were wounded. When people started arriving at the hospital, many had been hit by bombs or gunshots. On top of the trauma injuries, many children were suffering from malnutrition.

Just one troubled area in one troubled country. Who is on the frontline helping those in crisis, not just in Syria but all around the world? The answer is Medecins San Frontieres (MSF).

MSF, known in English as Doctors without Borders, is an international humanitarian medical organisation of French origin. It is best known for its work and projects in conflict zones and in countries affected by endemic diseases.

Over 30,000 personnel, mostly local doctors, nurses and other medical professionals, as well as logistical experts, water and sanitation engineers and administrators, provide medical aid in more than 70 countries. The vast majority of staff are volunteers. 90% of MSF's funding comes from private donors.

In 1999 MSF received the Nobel Peace Prize in recognition of its members' continued efforts to provide medical care in acute crises, as well as raising international awareness of potential humanitarian disasters.
