Remembering

Jennny Whitehead

Jenny was born in Whitstable in 1936 to Jim and Marnie Fairburn. They moved to Petts Wood and then the Second World War arrived, during which she had stints away on farms near Cirencester. After the war she went to Ashford Girls school as a boarder.

As a nurse she took the opportunity to travel and work abroad - first in Canada, then travelling around America with friends. She later worked as a nurse for BP in Aden (now in Yemen) and in Singapore as a ward sister. She was modest about the travelling, brushing it off as if it was the norm.

Jenny came back to the UK, to train to secure more money and a better post. She was also a midwife, a health visitor and a teacher of midwifery.

She met Alan at Park Langley Tennis Club and they married in 1974. They were a very strong partnership: Jenny supported Alan in running his company.

Their daughters Sonia and then Lucy followed a few years later. Once they had left home Jenny took Alan on adventures so that he could experience the world as she had, including trips to Brazil, the Caribbean and India. She was however more interested in how you travelled somewhere rather than where you had been.

Jenny always liked to be active - in addition to tennis she went water skiing and sailing and her main sporting love was golf.

After stopping paid work after Lucy was born, Jenny always volunteered. She was Brown Owl at St Mary's Wednesday Brownies for over ten years.

She listened to children at Alexandra Infant School reading and volunteered at Bromley District Talking News, helping to pack and deliver audio papers for the blind. She was also a keen committee member of the Park Langley Residents' Association.

A strong woman, Jenny took every opportunity that came to her, saw things in a positive way, had a sense of fun and most of all loved people. Even when she was in hospital as a patient, the nurses commented how she was rare in asking them about their families and lives.

Hike and chips!


Every two years Friday Guides and 7th Bromley Scouts get

together for a night hike from Keston to Shortlands. It was a very muddy walk this year, but the highlight as always was the chip stop in Hayes. The



residents in George Lane must have wondered what was going on as the Scouts and Guides sat on the pavement outside their houses, and 52 portions of chips disappeared in double-quick time! Water bottles were topped up, and then the hikers, suitably refreshed, resumed their route back to Shortlands.

The Guides slept over in the Church Hall, the Scouts in the Scout Hut, and then the Scouts treated everyone to bacon butties for breakfast in the Scout Hut. This set the Guides up well for their annual task of posy making in church ready for Mothering Sunday the following day.



This impressive parish church in Lennard Road Penge was built in 1878, during the rapid expansion of church building in the Victorian age. The land was provided by that generous benefactor, Albemarle Cator, who also funded the enlargement of St. George's. Francis Peek, whose name is synonymous with Peek Frean biscuits, financed the building works as a memorial to his parents.

Two noted architect friends collaborated on its design, H. Dawkes, an admirer of Pugin, and E.F.C. Clarke, noted for promoting the Gothic Revival style in churches. The distinctive west tower was added in 1883. The church features on the Penge Heritage Trail downloadable from www.pengeheritagetrail.org.uk

Internally there were beautiful decorative mosaics by the noted Venetian artist Antonio Salviati, which were unfortunately mostly destroyed in the 1993 arson attack. Photos taken of the interior before the fire show a very traditional and spacious, cruciform layout. Within the grounds there stands a Grade 2 listed, Portland stone war memorial.

The church has emerged, phoenix-like, from the flames. Its interior has been reordered to provide a flexible worship and activity space, whilst the former apse has become a peaceful memorial garden. This is all to enable the church to continue its outreach in the community. A major achievement is the Living Well charity, founded by the previous vicar, Nick Reed, which offers a range of activities, assistance and advice to local people.

In a momentous leap of faith in 2021, Holy Trinity combined with St. John the Evangelist, Penge to become one church, Holy Trinity with St. John's. The other half of the story is to follow...

Transform Trade

Was your Easter egg made of Fair Trade chocolate? If it was, you can be reassured that no child or slave labour was involved in the growing and harvesting of the cocoa, the farmers received a fair price for their cocoa and a premium was paid to the community or co-operative for that community to decide how they use it. This may have been to improve healthcare or the water supply in their area or to improve a local school.

Transform Trade (formerly known as Traidcraft Exchange) is a global community of farmers, workers, collectives, campaigners, donors and supporters, each committed to transforming trade so that everyone benefits. Wherever possible, they take a lead from people with direct experience of injustice in trade and partner with them to move forward to a better system and a better world. 'People centred trade' is a different way to do business.

Here at St Mary's we are signed up to be a Fair Trade Church. One of the things we do to is to serve Fair Trade refreshments wherever possible.

We hold two monthly stalls of fairly traded goods, on the second Sunday of each month after the 10.30am service and on the last Wednesday of the month at the Community Café from 11am. We also hold the yearly Big Brew event and have additional events during Fair Trade Fortnight, which this year falls between September 9th and 21st.

As well as leading services as part of the Biggin Hill Memorial Chapel team (see January SPAN) I am also a Day Chaplain at Rochester Cathedral. This takes me to the Cathedral monthly to lead the communal prayers which occur four times during the day. More importantly I engage with the many visitors, the volunteers and the paid staff.

I listen to concerns, pray with people and help when needed. Visitors come from near and far, and I especially enjoy engaging with young families and the many veterans who come to remember colleagues. It is a full and very busy day but one where I believe I can make a difference and bring the love of God into people's lives.

I have had the opportunity to lead a service in a City church, say Grace at a City Banquet at Guildhall, and the privilege of preaching at St Paul's Cathedral in February by the kind invitation of the Dean. The latter was an amazing experience and it was wonderful to meet people from all over the world at the end of the service.

This, alongside my ministry at St Mary's, has been a humbling experience, taking me out of my comfort zone, enabling me to be a small part of the faith journeys of so many.


I look forward to where the next five years of ministry takes me, and being part of God's plan for Shortlands.
