

Reflecting - and celebrating

As I write, we are in the first week of Lent, the period in the Christian calendar which represents the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness before beginning his public ministry. Lent starts on Ash Wednesday – ashes symbolising mortality and repentance – and traditionally ends on Easter Saturday or 'Holy Saturday': the day after Jesus was crucified but before the joy of the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter Day. Although Lent lasts for more than 40 days, this is because Sundays, as days when Christians celebrate the resurrection, are not included in Lent.

For Christians, Lent is a time for reflection and encouraging each other to take time to think about our priorities in life. At St Mary's we have been following a series called the 'Rhythm of Life' created by the diocese of Leeds. It is inspired by the work of religious communities and a paraphrase of Matthew 11.28: *'Come to me. Get away with me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with me and work with me - watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace.'*

The series is an opportunity to re-align and keep Christ at the centre of our daily lives, focusing on both our own wellbeing and practical commitments to the good of others. If you are interested to find out more there are booklets in the church which give a bible passage, questions to think about and prayers on each of the five themes we have been looking at: resting, creating, sharing, encouraging and celebrating.

As we come toward the end of Lent, the final theme – 'celebrating' – focuses not, as you might expect, on Easter Day but rather on the Last Supper, when Jesus celebrated the Jewish Passover with his friends before his crucifixion. This brought together the celebration of the liberation of the Jews

from slavery in Egypt, many centuries before, with Jesus offering the bread and wine of the Passover as his body and blood to be a strength and stay for his disciples in years to come. He is present with us as we remember his sacrifice and seek inspiration in both the suffering and the joy. Change, serve, grow

St Mary's is part of Beckenham Deanery, a group of 12 churches in the local area. Each Deanery is headed by the Area Dean, and the Deanery Synod is the overarching decision-making group of clergy and laity. On 10th March our previous Area Dean, Rev. Jeremy Blunden of St George's, stepped, down and Rev. Richard Jones of Christ Church and St. Paul's Anerley was commissioned to the role for the next five years.

On the same evening, Bishop Jonathan, the Bishop of Rochester, addressed Beckenham and Bromley Deanery Synods on the Vision and Strategy of the Diocese. These have three strands: Change, Serve, and Grow. They are underpinned by 'Seeking first the kingdom of God', which is the basis of all that your parish church does.

After the Covid pandemic when many people started to 'do' church differently and church attendance fell, and then the global situation which is scary for many, there has been an increase in the number of people seeking spiritual answers, resulting in a rise in attendance as was evident at the Christmas services at St Mary's.

Now the Diocese wants to enable and continue that growth through its appointment of missional leaders, such as our new incumbent Revd David Edmundson who we are welcoming on 6th May. The work includes training and equipping volunteers so that we can build our outreach groups to share the love of God with the community and ensure that our churches are safe and nurturing environments where growth can take place, and where all are welcome.

We hope that you will be part of this exciting vision for our diocese and parish, and that our church will be the centre of our community as we seek to show God's glory here in Shortlands. **Ann-Marie Jefferys**

Commemorating VE Day

On May 3^{rd} we will be opening the church to a display of memorabilia related to the events of World War Two and how it impacted the residents of Shortlands. The exhibition is scheduled to coincide with the 80^{th} anniversary of Victory in Europe Day on 8^{th} May 1945.

As we are delighted to be holding the Installation of our new Vicar, Revd David Edmondson on May 6th, only part of the display will be in place between May 3rd and May 7th. The rest of the display will be erected on Wednesday May 7th and will remain until Sunday May 18th.

A Tea Party will be held on Saturday May 10th at 3pm. All are welcome: you are encouraged to dress in 1940s-style clothes if you wish. Tickets will be available at the beginning of April from the church office.

We are still seeking memorabilia and memories from World War Two, especially anything concerning residents of Shortlands and it is hoped to display these in the church.

Time to be counted

The electoral roll is the register of electors who can vote at St Mary's Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). Those on the roll can also stand for election to the Parochial Church Council and/or any other church bodies such as the Deanery, Diocesan or General Synod. People who live outside the parish but are on the electoral roll also enjoy all the rights and privileges that go with living in the parish (for example baptisms, funerals and weddings).

Every sixth year the roll has to be compiled from scratch: this is the case in 2025. Everyone will need to reapply to be on the electoral roll - even if you were on last year's list.

To be included on the roll, people who are not ordained ministers must be 16 or over by the date of the APCM and have been baptised and submitted a signed application form. They must also be a member of the Church of England, <u>or</u> of a church in communion with the Church of England, <u>and</u> live in the parish; or, if not living in the parish, have habitually attended public worship in the parish in the previous six months.

From 10th March you can collect an application form from the back of church or email <u>secretary@stmaryshortlands.church</u> to request a form. Completed forms can be dropped into the Church House letterbox. Alternatively, visit

SPANA

SPANA – originally the Society for the Protection of Animals in North Africa - was established in 1923. The charity has worked towards improving the welfare of working animals in vulnerable communities across the world through three key areas: Treating, Training and Teaching.

The fortunes of working animals and people go hand in hand: in low income countries just one working animal can support an extended family of up to 30 people. SPANA provides practical, professional and sustainable solutions to the welfare of these working animals.

It 'Treats' by providing veterinary care and support. It 'Trains' by building expertise amongst vets, farriers, harness makers and the owners of the animals. It 'Teaches' in schools to develop positive beliefs, respect and compassion towards the animals. In emergencies, they will be on the ground in times of crisis.

Working with some of the poorest people and in the most remote areas of the world, SPANA is improving the lives of the animals that plough fields and transport goods, people, tourists and water. Horses, donkeys, camels, elephants, dogs, and oxen: the SPANA vets are the only vets these animals will see.

One recent project in Zimbabwe is a workshop run mostly by women to make harnesses for donkeys that will not cause injuries. The harnesses are made from more suitable materials for the hot weather the donkeys work in. The sewing machines are powered by solar power as there are long and frequent power cuts in the area. This project not only helps the working animals but provides employment for local people.
