

# **A Christmas Carol**

Charles Dickens' classic Christmas story has been portrayed in different ways over the years including heart-rending Victorian poverty and the humour of the Muppets. It introduces us not only to Scrooge, huge Christmas dinners, white Christmases and the trappings of a Victorian Christmas, but also to the idea of *Christmas Past, Christmas Future* and *Christmas Present*.

But these three aspects of Christmas have always been at the heart of the Christian understanding of Christmas and reflected upon during Advent, the four-week build up to Christmas Day. We started this period of hope and anticipation with our Advent Carol Service.

*Christmas Past* is the birth of Jesus, over two thousand years ago, in a manger in Bethlehem which we celebrate on 25 December with our nativity scenes, giving of presents and Christmas dinner.

The birth of Jesus had been predicted by Old Testament prophets, such as Isaiah, over 700 years beforehand. Jesus told his followers that in the future he would return to earth and establish a New Creation; a Kingdom of justice and peace. Without the nightmare scenarios of Charles Dickens, we look forward to this second coming of Jesus: *Christmas Future*.

The life changing experience for Scrooge, and his rediscovery of what Christmas is about, is shown in *Christmas Present*. Jesus invites us all to meet with him, rediscover him and reflect upon our perspectives this Christmas.

We hope that, through the different services on offer at St Mary's this year, as well as singing Christmas carols, we will offer opportunities for you to experience Jesus: through the peace and reflection of our **Taize Service**; the sense of joy and wonder of our children's **Christingle** and **Crib Services**; the overview of the Christmas story, and glorious singing, at **Nine Lessons and Carols**; the sense of fulfilment and wonder of **Midnight Mass**; and the joyful family celebration of **Christmas Day**.

In a dark, confusing and often lonely world we hope that our services will offer light, purpose and

# Ann Gramlich

Born of Welsh parents, being Welsh was a cornerstone of Ann's life. Her father instilled in her a love of music and singing, as well as rugby.

He sadly died when Ann was just 13 years old and this tragedy marked Ann for life. She also had to grow up quickly as her mother - just 40 years old at the time - relied heavily on Ann for mental support.

Ann studied for a degree at University College

Cardiff and met Dieter (from Mannheim, Germany) during her year as an English Assistant in Lille from 1963 – 64. They got engaged in Mannheim in 1966 and married two years later in St Thomas' Church in Neath, where Ann's maternal family lived.

After her degree Ann started teaching French in Ystrad Mynach until 1970 when Dieter joined Midland Bank International in the City of London. They moved to Bromley and Ann taught in a Croydon school until their daughter Jane was born in October 1972. The family moved to St Mary's Avenue in 1975.

In September 1977 Dieter was posted to the bank's office in Frankfurt / Main for nearly 4 years. Ann meanwhile taught English to adults and became fluent in German.

Returning to the UK in April 1981, Ann taught French and German in various secondary schools in Croydon. She retired from teaching in 2007 but continued one day a week as a Counsellor until 2010. She also spent eight years as a Governor at Castlecombe Primary School in Mottingham.

Apart from teaching her main interest lay in music. For 30 years she was a member of the Wandle Ringers handbells group. Her other interests included needlework in general, guilting, cross-stitch and collecting vintage china and art.

Above all her love for her family, especially her two grandsons Ned and Clyde, dominated her later life.

Ann had always been a Christian at heart, albeit only practising again in the last three years. She was delighted when Revd Gary gave her the opportunity to become christened and confirmed two years ago.

Ann was a dedicated and inspirational teacher for over 40 years and touched many peoples' lives in her career.

# My day job

It has been an interesting journey to St Mary's Shortlands for Adrian and me.

Not long after qualifying in medicine we went to work overseas and spent 20 years abroad in Jamaica, Trinidad, Saudi Arabia and Oman. The hardest time of all for a Christian was in Saudi Arabia where the practice of any religion other than Islam was brutally forbidden. To worship, Christians met in each



other's homes, which were rotated regularly to avoid detection reminiscent of the very first Christians.

In Oman we could worship freely but with just one Protestant church it had to meet the needs of a very varied multicultural population from Syrian Orthodox through to Pentecostals. This taught us a tolerance for different Christian practices.

As our two sons were coming up for university and GCSEs, we took a family decision to move back to the UK in 1994. Adrian and I started work back in the NHS and we lived in Hertfordshire in a village with a very ecumenical village church. When we retired we moved to London where our grandchildren were growing up.

We are so glad to now be attending St Mary's which has a wealth of warmth, fellowship and humanity. Above all it is a place of joy - the Christian message of love and joy is an important one to share and St Mary's shares this in abundance.

I now volunteer in a secular capacity as an Official Prison Visitor (OPV): this means I am not affiliated to any religious group and will see prisoners of any faith or none. The OPVs are key holders which means going onto the wings and into the cells when required. There are three of us at HMP Brixton and two of us are committed Christians.

# Future Generations - update

In November the Parochial Church Council gave the go-ahead for fundraising to enable works to the church building which will allow it to be used more flexibly, including replacing the heating system.

Building on the success of the Community Café, the changes planned by the Future Generations Project will help the church to support a greater range of community activities during the week for children and family groups, events of all kinds and special occasions. Flexible seating will also enable our beautiful church to be used for different kinds of worship services.

The changes to the heating, flooring and seating are estimated to cost in the region of  $\pm 275,000$ : over  $\pm 120,000$  has already been raised.
