Looking closer at the mystery of Christmas and the supporting characters, we begin to realise that the shepherds and the Magi - or kings - have much in common. Far from being uneducated roughnecks, shepherds are now widely believed to have been experts in rearing flawless lambs for rituals in the Temple, fully understanding their religious and traditional responsibilities as written in their holy scriptures. They discern a crucial link between their swaddled lambs and the babe in the manger.

The kings come from a sophisticated culture of ancient writings, exotic ritual and hidden magic. From their astronomical studies of the stars and prophetic texts they discern that something magnificent and significant is beginning in the land of Palestine. They come prepared to greet the King of the Jews with costly gifts in humble curiosity.



#### Church buildings update

Some years ago we started to look at options for the church hall, which was beginning to show structural problems. We spent some time considering potential ways forward, and then COVID happened...

As a result of these delays, this year we decided to review the whole project. Over the coming weeks, in consultation with the Diocese and the new Archdeacon, we will appoint an architect to review the progress we have made and look at how to take the project forward.

In the meantime, work to maintain the church and associated buildings continues as normal. On the main body of the church, works are planned for both the external and internal sides of the nave roof. Externally the main task is to replace the existing ridge tiles with new ones, along with other more minor jobs. Internally, the work involves rubbing down and repainting rust spots that have been identified since the steelwork was last repainted between 2015 and 2017.

The PCC will also be considering plans to update the highly successful – but temporary - refreshment servery, used at the weekly Community Café, to comply with diocesan standards and integrate more harmoniously with the architecture of the building.

#### Wilding the church grounds

Churches are being increasingly encouraged to turn some of their grounds over to wildflowers to encourage and feed bees, butterflies and other insects, and I am pleased to report that St Mary's is joining in with this initiative – with the help of Beckenham Rotary Club which has offered 'labour' and provided

some funding.

We intend to remove or scarify parts of the lawns and sow seeds; this is too extensive to do all in one go but we are starting it off this Autumn with two areas – a strip a metre or so wide alongside the steps down from



St Mary's Avenue, and another from behind the hedge and bushes near the main entrance gate down to Kingswood Road.

In the first of these we will sow a wildflower mixture; at least some should germinate in the Spring, and we can re-sow then if necessary. In the second strip the grass will be scarified, and Yellow Rattle sown – the seeds



need cold winter weather in order to germinate. The plant is parasitic on grass roots so is a good way of keeping the grass down in future years, and hopefully next Spring we will have a sweeping bed of bright yellow flowers.

A couple more areas will follow next year, so watch this space – or rather those spaces.

#### Celebrating a community treasure

Denise Janes (known to her friends as Dee), the Station Master at Shortlands station, has become a community treasure, known for her acerbic wit, rebellious spirit and generous heart for the community and individuals in need.

An enterprising 15-year-old, Dee left school and the care system. Always rebellious, Dee was called 'the devil's child' by the catholic nuns. She worked for a butcher securing accommodation and free meat. Twenty one years ago she joined the rail industry for better career prospects.

Often controversial, her extraordinary displays at the station have raised  $\pounds 460,000$  for charity, individuals, schools and the



community, notably Help for Heroes, Demelza Hospice and treatment for a woman with cancer.

The annual Halloween party is a Shortlands highlight. The animated, lighted displays are shrouded in smoke and accompanied by spooky music. Hundreds of people whilst laughing, crying, screaming and eating cupcakes, donated over £1,100 for Valley School.

The models, worthy of a professional stage, are funded by Dee and created and assembled with the help of Bob, her station assistant. Dee may get her interest in anatomy and dissection from her stepfather who works for Transcare International at Battersea Hospital heliport.

The National Rail modernisation programme, which threatened closure of the ticket office, will bypass Shortlands after community intervention, and Christmas carols will be sung at the station again this year.

Dee has two children and six grandchildren as well as a little army of dachshunds who can be seen in the station office.

Rightly, Dee's work was recognised with the Bromley Hero award: characteristically she gave the prize money to charity. She has recently been awarded the Life Saver award for preventing a stabbing on the station and locking the culprits up until the police arrived!

When she retires she hopes to hold a Halloween party in Highgate cemetery and spend time in her home in Spain. Meanwhile she continues her role as matriarch of Shortlands with her significant fund-raising activities and quiet acts of kindness to those in need.
