#### **Questions, questions!**

In November, St Mary's hosted a group of about 40 year 6 students from Harris Primary Academy Shortlands. They came primarily to ask questions about Mary, the mother of Jesus, that had come from discussions in their Religious Education classes.

What an amazing group! These are a few of the questions they asked: Was Mary black or white? Is the Bible diverse? Why isn't Joseph as important as Mary? Who was Elizabeth? There were many questions about original sin and its relationship to Mary. What are the qualities of Mary? Did Mary go to be with God when she died?

All of the students were quiet, attentive and respectful of others' questions: their questions were clearly and confidently presented.

After all their questions had been addressed, we had a short time to speak about St Mary's Shortlands, including the bombing of the church in World War Two and its rebuilding in the 1950s. We looked at the baptismal font, and the silver used in the Eucharist.

Before they returned to the school, they saw the stone carving of Mary and Jesus on a donkey, high over the East window. This carving is a reminder of the original church building which had three stained glass windows, one of which showed the Flight to Egypt.

We enjoyed hosting them and hope they return again.

The Green Flag is the quality mark for parks and signifies particularly: a high level of managed maintenance; a welcoming and safe experience; environmentally and biodiversity friendly; community involvement; and of heritage value.

# **MISSION OF THE MONTH**

#### The Leprosy Mission

Leprosy is widely believed to be the world's oldest disease, a chronic bacterial infection which is only mildly infectious, causing nerve damage and muscle weakness that can lead to deformities, crippling, blindness and isolation.

The Leprosy Mission is a global Christian organisation, founded in 1874, now working in 28 countries, with its focus on 10 countries in Africa and Asia, providing and evaluating a range of medical and social projects that help transform the lives of those affected by leprosy.

Over 200,000 new cases of leprosy were recorded by the World Health Organisation in 2019 and there are around 3 million people suffering from irreversible disabilities caused by the disease.

There is currently no vaccine generally available to specifically prevent leprosy but a multidrug therapy - MDT consisting of a combination of specific antibiotics has been freely available since 1982, providing a cure which will, within a short time after commencement of treatment, render the patient non-infectious and stop the disease progressing. However, the cure will not reverse any disability or permanent damage previously caused by the disease and symptoms can take a long time to develop - around five years on average and early diagnosis and treatment is therefore essential wherever possible

Leprosy patients are in the high-risk category for Covid-19, meaning that the virus brings new life-threatening challenges to their doors, and the task of caring for leprosy patients has never been more challenging than at the present time.
