Wartime memories

Last year St Mary's commemorated the anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day. We continue an occasional series featuring contributions from the display of parishioners' memories.

I was evacuated to Yeovil for two or three years. My mother kept threatening me as to what would happen to me if I didn't keep hold of my brother. When we got to Yeovil people came and said 'I'll take this girl' but I said 'I cannot come with you without my brother' because I was determined not to be separated from him. In the end Mrs Wilson, who was in charge of placing us with families, took us both.

I had a wonderful time because I prefer the country to the town. They were extremely kind and I wish now I had appreciated them more in days gone by. Mr Wilson was in the local Home Guard. He used to go off with his gun once a week. He told us that if we were playing in the fields and a van or truck came past with a Swastika and a German flag on it, we were to stand by the road and wave and smile at them. The adults really thought we were going to be invaded.

Our house in Walworth had been badly damaged by a land mine but had been repaired. My parents disagreed as to whether to return to that house or to go to live in Peckham, in a house that my aunt knew of that had been abandoned by people. My mother won, which was just as well because that same night the Walworth house was destroyed by a flying bomb!

I was about 18 by VE Day and I was used to going up to Victoria on a Sunday night to hear Dr Sangster at the Central Methodist Centre. We took the number 12 bus to Victoria. We walked from there to the Palace. There were soldiers, sailors, and airmen of different nationalities. Every now and then a group would surround you and join you to dance with various people. We saw Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret on the balcony but weren't fortunate enough to see them in the crowd.

Old Queen Mary came on the balcony as well as the King and Queen. We stayed because we wanted to see the King and Queen again, and every time the curtains drew back a great cheer would go up. By the time we decided to go home it was so late that we missed the last bus, and it was a long walk home to Peckham.

Learning together

During Advent three groups met, two in church and one online, to follow a course called 'They Sang'. We studied and discussed the four songs of the Christmas Story in the Gospel of Luke – the Benedictus, the Magnificat, the Gloria, and the Nunc Dimittis.

Although these songs were sung two thousand years ago by Zechariah, Mary, the angels and Simeon respectively, we still use them today as part of our church services. The beginning of Luke's gospel is just like a theatrical musical, with people bursting into song. We discussed how these biblical songs look back to the Old Testament, are 'in the moment' of when they were said or sung, how they affect our daily lives, and look forward to the coming of God's glory in the future. There were opportunities for personal reflection, prayer, praise and music.

At St Mary's we hold groups like these to help people understand the Bible better, to explore questions they may have, to build a relationship with Jesus and to look at their own lives. We have groups that meet throughout the year as people find them very helpful.

Our next course will be during Lent: do look out for details in SPAN. They are open to everyone so please do come and join us!

Wildlife in winter



Winter is an unloved season. We do our best to glamourise it, imagining Dickensian snow scenes and idealised family gatherings around tables groaning with food, while the air is filled with cries of fellowship and kindness to all.

I'm afraid nature has a more Scrooge-like view of the season. For birds and animals it is a season of dearth and cold, when their resources will be tested. Some, like the jays, nuthatches and squirrels, have hidden their autumn loot of nuts and seeds. Now they just need to remember where, and hope nobody else has got there first! The urban foxes will need to scavenge ever more diligently.

Many small birds, like the tits, robins and goldfinches, will rely on us to feed them now, more than at any other time of the year, and visits to feeders are part of their daily routine. Nature provides few comforts at this time of the year. If there has been a mild autumn, there may still be some berries unpicked for the thrushes and blackbirds. The winter berries of holly and ivy are most welcome now.

Life is hardest for those who depend on insects, like the wren and the goldcrest. Dense cover like thick hedges and ivy provides them with the best chance of finding the small spiders, woodlice and other insects they need.

Winter can provide a wildlife spectacle, but for that we need to go to the coast to see the huge flocks of wading birds and Brent geese that winter on the mud there, or perhaps to see the fantastical shape of a murmuration of starlings coming to roost under Brighton Pier, wheeling and swirling in perfect synchronisation to confuse a predatory peregrine falcon.

For those who can't venture far from home, now is the time to keep your feeders full and, if we have a hard frost, provide fresh unfrozen water. That way we can enjoy our own miniature feeding frenzy and know that we are providing support to our garden birds when it is most needed.

MISSION OF THE MONTH

The Leprosy Mission

Leprosy should be a thing of the past but it still devastates the lives of thousands of innocent children every year. The annual number of new cases diagnosed amongst sufferers of all ages remains at the staggering figure of around 200,000, with more than three million sufferers of this disease living with irreversible disability. They will require ongoing treatment and support for many years to come.

Left untreated, leprosy can cause progressive and permanent damage to the skin, nerves, limbs and eyes, not to mention the effects of stigma and rejection.


The Leprosy Mission (TLM) is a global Christian charity formed just over 150 years ago that provides a range of medical and social projects that truly transform the lives of those affected.

Research undertaken by TLM and its partners continues in order to find a fully effective and reliable vaccine. Meanwhile, a freely available cure in the form of a multi drug therapy can, if administered in promptly diagnosed cases, render the patient free from further damage and no longer infectious. However, fear and stigma associated with the disease can lead to a reluctance on the part of sufferers to come forward for prompt treatment.

TLM's work today is extensive and includes diagnosis, cure and rehabilitation, as well as providing water, sanitation, housing, education and sustainable livelihood opportunities.
