Remembrance Sunday last year at St Mary's was the first service I covered and was appointed interim priest in charge at the end of May this year.

On the final Saturday a small group of walkers did an 8-mile sponsored walk around the Beckenham churches and enjoyed looking inside several of the 10 churches on the route. The highlight was calling in at the Big Brekkie at the Baptist Church to have lunch. The money will be used by Christian Aid to help communities in Zimbabwe grow drought-tolerant crops and build store-rooms to preserve food during dry seasons.

MISSION OF THE MONTH

Mines Advisory Group

Since 1989, Mines Advisory Group (MAG) has helped over 19 million people in 68 countries rebuild their lives and livelihoods after war by finding and destroying landmines, cluster munitions and unexploded bombs.

Now MAG is set to deliver explosive ordnance risk education in Ukraine with operations to clear landmines and other munitions to commence later this year.

This charity has partnered with the non-profit <u>Ukrainian</u> <u>Deminers Association (UDA)</u> that will see long-term collaboration between the two organisations, prioritising the education of vulnerable communities about the inherent dangers.

This furthers MAG's ambitions to work closely with and complement the expertise available from local non-government organisations and state institutions. It will require hundreds of millions of pounds and decades of difficult work to clear such devastation.

Meanwhile, MAG has launched its 'Unlock the Land Appeal' to fund its vital work in Laos where for nine years, the equivalent of a planeload of bombs was dropped every eight minutes, day and night! Donations received before 24 July will be doubled by our Government.

Sitting comfortably

Regular readers will remember that the Future Generations Project aims to upgrade our church building with improved heating and flexible seating, enabling it to be used for a far wider range of community and church activities, and benefiting the people of Shortlands for generations to come. This will also help us to provide space for church services and for local groups during any future development of the church halls.

We have already moved some pews at the back of the church so we could open the Community Café and have welcomed a range of other community activities into the church building.

Plans are being developed, for the next phase of the project which will include gaining formal permission from the Chancellor of the Diocese of Rochester to replace all of the pews with flexible seating. We estimate that the cost of this new seating will be at least £100 per chair – and we'll need 400 of them, so St Mary's 'Donate a Chair' campaign is aiming to raise at least £40,000.

We know that these are difficult financial times for many – but every £100 will help. Chairs will not be personalised, but there will be a list on display in church recording all donations.
