## Wartime memories

Our recent VE Day exhibition displayed many memories of the Second World War from members of St Mary's congregation. We think these deserve an even wider audience so will be sharing some of them in SPAN in future months, starting with these recollections from Stan Clark.

3<sup>rd</sup> September 1939, War declared. My father was already in the Territorial Army so was called up straight away but he and my mother decided that I should be evacuated. A friend asked if their son Alan could come with me. We had to report to a school at Clapham Junction but they decided we were too young to go alone so my mother came too.

Train from Clapham Junction to Hove then to a local school. In the playground there were rows of wooden chairs, on the back there was a carrier bag containing tea, biscuits and other things including half a bar of chocolate, unheard of for us boys of 7.

We were taken to live with Mrs Christopher of Gladstone Road, Hove. Us boys jumped up and down on the bed and it was claimed we broke the bulbs in the flat below, my mother had to pay for new ones!

School was shared with the local children, half a day in school, half a day on the beach. Then Dunkirk happened, so they moved us inland. By then they considered we were old enough to be on our own. They put us in a house with a big estate. We used to pinch the apples from the orchard and hide the cores in the piggery (no pigs) but were found out and told off.

Another move to a family in Old Woking. Every time you went out you had to take your gas mask with you. They were looked at from time to time and mine had the eye glass broken so I would not last long if there was a gas attack. School was under the stadium of Woking Football Club.

Next time, Stan moves back to London and shares his memories of bombings and VE Day.

#### **Our new Secretary**

At the Annual Parochial Church Meeting in May, Helen Bird took over the important role of PCC Secretary from Jay Sharma.

Helen told us: 'the role involves supporting the role of the Vicar and Parochial Church Council, including preparation for meetings, taking notes, recording minutes, some record keeping, formal notifications required to the diocese, etc. I shall also be responsible for the electoral roll. I am very new to this so I imagine the role will grow and evolve as I gain more understanding - there will be a bit of a learning curve. There is a handbook!'

Robin and I got married in St Mary's in 2016, so you are kind of stuck with me now.... ## For the record

The church has to keep many records to satisfy legal and diocesan requirements: for example, records of baptisms, marriages and funerals.

We have also amassed a large collection of historic documents and photographs. Even when we no longer have to hold records at the church, some have to be transferred to the Archives at the London Borough of Bromley.

We have been able to use these historic materials to mount displays such as the recent excellent VE Day exhibition.

Kay Coleman, who led the team mounting the VE Day exhibition, has kindly agreed to become our Parish Archivist, overseeing the recording and management of these files and transferring them to the Bromley Archives when required.

Kay said: 'I feel honoured to have been appointed as the Parish Archivist for St Mary's Church. Having long loved genealogy and historical research, I look forward to exploring and recording the church history and archives in more depth, adding to them and working in collaboration with the Bromley Archives.'

## St John's Eden Park

The electrification of the railway branch line between Hayes and Elmers End via Eden Park in 1925 brought through trains to London in 1926: this encouraged more rapid development of affordable housing, making Eden Park an attractive option for growing numbers of commuters.



Along with all the amenities needed for suburban life, it was

noted that there was a lack of churches to minister to the spiritual needs of the people. A Mrs Petley generously gave the land on the east side of Eden Park Avenue for building a church and on 19<sup>th</sup> July 1931 the first congregation gathered in a field and conducted a service with a portable organ.

The congregation of Christ Church Beckenham had undertaken to raise the funds to start a daughter church in Eden Park 'provided that the evangelical principles which are so dear to us all and for which we stand are properly safeguarded'.

When the Mission Hall on Croydon Road closed in 1931 it was dismantled, re-erected and enlarged in Eden Park and dedicated as a temporary church in February 1932. The foundation stone for the new church was laid in June 1932. Only a year later, the completed church was dedicated by the Bishop!

The church was designed by Pite, Son and Fairweather (Mr. Pite was a member of Christ Church). The builder was J. Ellerman and Son who also built the Town Hall and much of the Marian Vian schools.

The building's exterior is somewhat spartan in appearance, plain brick, likened by some to a factory or warehouse. Inside, the lack of columns allows an unimpeded view across the church, a spacious, simple design with excellent acoustics.

As elsewhere, St John's was not unscathed by World War Two. The Beckenham Journal of February 1945 said that 'the bomb landed in a field behind a modern C of E church. The building was badly damaged and the church hall [the former Mission Hall] was smashed'. This has been replaced by an enviable complex of two halls, committee rooms and a lively café.

## Thank you Sammy!

Local resident Sammy Marshall is making a much-valued contribution to St Mary's while he works towards his Silver Duke of Edinburgh Award which requires, amongst other things, volunteering within the community.

He has lived in Shortlands all his life, having attended the Thursday toddler group, Preschool and Beavers at St Mary's.

#### The Mission to Seafarers

This year, St Mary's celebrated 'Sea Sunday' early on 29<sup>th</sup> June with a guest speaker: The Ven. Dr Peter Rouch, the Secretary General of Mission to Seafarers (MTS).

We are all part of the shipping world, be it going on a cruise or as evidenced by the goods in our homes. Did you know that more than 90% of all our goods and fuels come by sea? Shipping is an essential part of the global economy, and demand for seafarers is consistently high. Their work however is mostly under-appreciated and is often in less than ideal conditions.

Many regularly work long voyages of up to nine months, leaving them isolated from family and friends, which unsurprisingly can have a detrimental effect on their mental health. Life on board ship is tough and often dangerous with extreme weather conditions, war zones, shipwreck and piracy ever present threats.

MTS operate day and night, 365 days a year. Their port chaplains' frequent visits onboard and on-shore centres provide respite and welfare for all seafarers.

Our church has supported MTS for many years, with knitted hats from our Craft and Chatter group and Christmas cards hand made by our uniformed organisations. Together with monies from our collection in church these are much needed and greatly appreciated by this global charity which looks after the men and women working in the profession and their families worldwide.
