This month sees the beginning of Lent, a penitential season in the church, where Christians traditionally prepare for the death and resurrection of Jesus in quiet contemplation, meditation and prayer. For many, it is also a time for giving up pleasures and helping others.

The Fourth Sunday of Lent is known as Mothering Sunday. In medieval times this was intended for people to visit the church where they had been baptised – your 'Mother' church. Later it became the day when those in service were given the day off to visit their mothers. Today we celebrate and give thanks for our mothers, and all who mother us, for all that they do. Flowers and chocolates are the order of the day as well as attending church.

Mothering Sunday is a reminder of all female role models and, in this Platinum Jubilee year, Her Majesty the Queen is a wonderful example, a 'mother' to the nation and Commonwealth. The Archbishop of Canterbury called her a 'symbol of stability and hope' and said that the Queen should be praised for 'her dedication to us all, and her faithful witness to Jesus Christ', words that might be applicable to our mothers. They are always there for us, help and serve us through our lives. These are not just qualities of mothers but of fathers and all who parent too!

God is often called 'Father', as we say in the Lord's Prayer. God is a parent to us all. He loved us so much that He sent his only Son, Jesus, as a baby, to live an earthly life, to die an horrific death, but to rise from the dead so that we might be forgiven our sins and have eternal life. Like all parents, His love for us is unconditional, and He is always there for us.

During Lent, and especially on Mothering Sunday, it would be a real joy to welcome you to St. Mary's – for a service, a coffee and chat at the Community Café, a Lent Group or one of our other

Preparing to lead

A moveable feast

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, is on 2 March this year. But why do the dates of both Ash Wednesday and Easter change each year?

Jesus' death and resurrection took place at the same time as the Jewish Passover which is celebrated on the first full moon following the Spring equinox.

During the early days of the church Christians celebrated Easter on different dates: some on the day of the Passover and some on the following Sunday. In the year 325 AD the Council of Nicaea established that Easter would be held on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the Spring equinox. Easter can therefore take place at any point between 22 March and 25 April.

This year, the March equinox occurs on Sunday, 20 March. The first full moon to occur after that date is April's full moon, which rises on Saturday 16 April. Therefore, Easter will be observed on the first Sunday after that date: Sunday, 17 April.

The period of Lent, in which we reflect and prepare for Christ's death and resurrection, lasts for 40 days; and so Ash Wednesday takes place six and a half weeks before Easter.

My name is Tim Aldred, and I've been a member of St Mary's for some years now. Last September I began training as a Church of England minister. It is something that I've thought and prayed about for a long time. I decided to explore it seriously a few years ago, before attending a selection panel this time last year.

I'm training part time, at St Augustine's College of Theology, which is based in the very lovely setting of West Malling Abbey in Kent. It is strange to find myself writing essays and sitting exams for the first time in a quarter of a century! I am enjoying the study and getting a lot out of it. I work for a charity in London, and they have kindly agreed to a 4 day week, which helps a lot.

Many people I talk to are interested in the spiritual side of life but find church doesn't connect to them very well. At the same time there's such a depth to Christian spirituality, with wisdom,



contemplation, inspiration and much more, which many have never explored. It feels like there's an opportunity to connect these things to a wider community, and I'm interested in what can be done differently to help this happen. As part of my 'homework' I will be helping to lead some services at St Mary's, so don't be surprised if you see me up at the front from time to time.

Babies and toddlers together again

The challenges of COVID have been hard on parents and carers with young children. The guidance to Baby and Toddler groups allowed us to set up outside again in May 2021 so an intrepid group of volunteers started running the group again under a marquee in the afternoon. They endured some very interesting weather conditions but happily carried on despite heavy rain and wind.

After the summer half term we were able to move inside, operating outside and inside the church on Thursday morning and afternoon. It was lovely to see parents talking to each other and empathising about the problems of bringing home newborns and lack of sleep. Conversations about birth experiences, weaning and potty training ensued. The children were able to see and play alongside each other. It was all so important for mental health and wellbeing, a joy to behold the support that communicating with others brings!

We continue to run both groups on a Thursday in term time: the morning session is 9.30am to 11.30am and the afternoon 12.30 to 2.00pm. We use the whole of the back of the church with its café facilities now in place. It is an airy open but inclusive space with a section for babies and plenty of room for toddlers to play in the home corner, do crafts, play with playdough or play with a variety of other toys.

Each session has a singing and/or story time followed by refreshments. The crafts tend to reflect the church year and we always hold an informal end of term service, often with a puppet story. In the summer we have a picnic party.

So far, the group has run on a 'just turn up' basis. Our aim is to be open to all as life with young children can be quite chaotic and difficult to plan.

MISSION OF THE MONTH

Friends of Griffins

Friends of Griffins is a small charity, run by volunteers. It was established to enhance and advance the life skills and education of children from the London Borough of Bromley who are born with or are affected by visual and/or hearing impairment.

The charity raises funds to provide equipment that will assist teachers of deaf and/or visually impaired children with their work. It has purchased equipment such as Spectrum Light Columns and an LED carpet for the specialist Sensory Room at the Griffins Sensory Support Centre in Orpington. These items are used by the teachers to stimulate and educate babies and children who are born with visual impairment.

It also purchased a small library of children's story books containing characters with cochlear implants: these books allow the children to relate and to understand that they can be a hero too! Laptops for children at the Griffins Centre were donated by Beckenham Rotary and the charity often liaises with other local charities and institutions and are grateful for their input.

Many activities for the children are funded by the charity, such as an annual trip to the Christmas Pantomime at the Churchill Theatre (captioned for deaf people). The charity also provides transport for the children to participate in outings, sporting occasions and outdoor educational activities.

The charity provides all this and much more: see the board in church during March for more information.
