

# **Time to Remember**

Whenever I walk beside the sea the smell of seaweed and salt spray pricks a memory of my father saying 'smell that ozone!' He encouraged us to breathe in deeply the health-giving properties of this enriched ocean air.

Smells, sounds, sights evoke that bitter-sweet reminder of those we have lost. Mario Lanza, O Christmas Tree, jellied eels: each memory triggers another, and we smile, feel a tear welling up, and a little stab of pain in our hearts.

The annual service for Departed Loved Ones at St Mary's on 6 November gives us a special time to lament, celebrate; to gently call to mind those we have loved and lost to death. As we allow ourselves to be immersed in the candle-light, the reflective words and the beauty of music, we give ourselves permission to remember. It is alright to feel, to weep, to laugh in this shared moment.

We ponder the meaning and purpose of our own lives. We give room to the sadness, perhaps regret and disappointment. We take hold of the assurance of forgiveness and opportunity for new beginnings, echoed in this poem by John Keble (1822):

'New every morning is the love our wakening and uprising prove; through sleep and darkness safely brought, restored to life and power and thought.'

We put fear aside, replaced with rejoicing in the promise that at our own death there will be an awakening to a new adventure, a new body for eternal life with our heavenly Father.




# On tour

## **Experiencing the Passion**

Eight members of St Mary's congregation were very fortunate to be part of a group from the Beckenham Deanery (with a few others) on a trip to the Oberammergau Passion Play in July.

The play itself was an unforgettable experience, with its cast of hundreds of villagers, camels, donkey, sheep, goats and doves, a choir of 60 and full orchestra. The essential truths and power of the story of the last week of the life of Christ - interspersed with scenes from the Old Testament - overcame the challenge of following the performance in German.

Staying in the village for a couple of days enabled us to get a sense of the extraordinary commitment of the villagers to this unique experience. It was first performed in 1634 when the village made a vow to perform the play once every ten years if God spared them from the plague. It seemed as if everyone had a connection to the play: the disciple John served us our dinner in the hotel between acts!

Our time in Oberammergau was preceded by a stay in the Austrian Lake District, during which we enjoyed trips on a 150 year -old paddle steamer, mountain railway and cable car. A particular highlight was the opportunity to tour round a local Benedictine monastery - founded only 20 years ago, the beautiful stained glass and wood carving in its chapel left a strong impression on us all. A trip to Salzburg and a tour around the lakes and villages enabled fans of the Sound of Music to visit some famous locations.

Many thanks are due to Ann-Marie Jefferys for coordinating the trip, and to all our touring companions with whom we enjoyed great fellowship.

# **Prison Fellowship**

Prison Fellowship (PF) was founded in 1976 in the USA by Charles Colson following his release from prison after serving a sentence for a crime related to Watergate. Shortly afterwards Sylvia Alison from the UK met with Charles Colson and believed this meeting was an answer to her prayers. Sylvia had envisaged an organisation where sisters and brothers in Christ could meet together, worship and pray for prisons and prisoners and use the power of God's love to improve their lives and reduce reoffending.

PF has grown since the 1970s and is now a worldwide organisation. There are over 100 local groups throughout the UK with committed volunteers. In addition to daily work with prisoners, assisting with services and running Bible study groups, there are other practical ways in which PF helps.

There is the 'Letter Link' where PF volunteers working from home write letters to prisoners. Very often this can be the only communication a prisoner will receive. The Sycamore Tree restorative justice programme is a victim awareness course delivered to prisoners by trained volunteers. The programme endeavours to help prisoners to explore the impact of their crime and hopefully reduce reoffending.

The Angel Tree Christmas programme enables parents in prison to send a gift to their children at Christmas, strengthening their parent-child relationship. PF volunteers work with prison chaplains and local churches to buy, wrap and deliver the presents. As long as prisoners are allowed access to their children, they are given the opportunity to apply for a gift to be sent to them. A special personal message from the parent is always included with the present, which helps to make the gift extra special.

# Wartime memories

In the early days of World War Two, Snow White had just been born and was the inspiration for our 'Dig for Victory' efforts as we turned over our patch of soil in Beckenham Lane to the growing of vegetables, shouldering our spades afterwards to the strains of 'Heigh-ho, heigh-ho, it's off to work we go'. Alongside our allotment were the ready-built concrete air raid shelters, down which we scuttled at practice time. (Better indeed than the ghastly, bare, canal-like trenches dug overnight on Queen's Mead slope).

Each child was asked to bring a small bar of chocolate (then 2d, I believe), as 'emergency rations', and we were assured that it could be consumed after an hour's incarceration. It was my complaint for years afterwards that we were always returned on the 'all clear' siren at one minute before the hour was up! Those sirens! That wailing was unlike anything else before or since.
